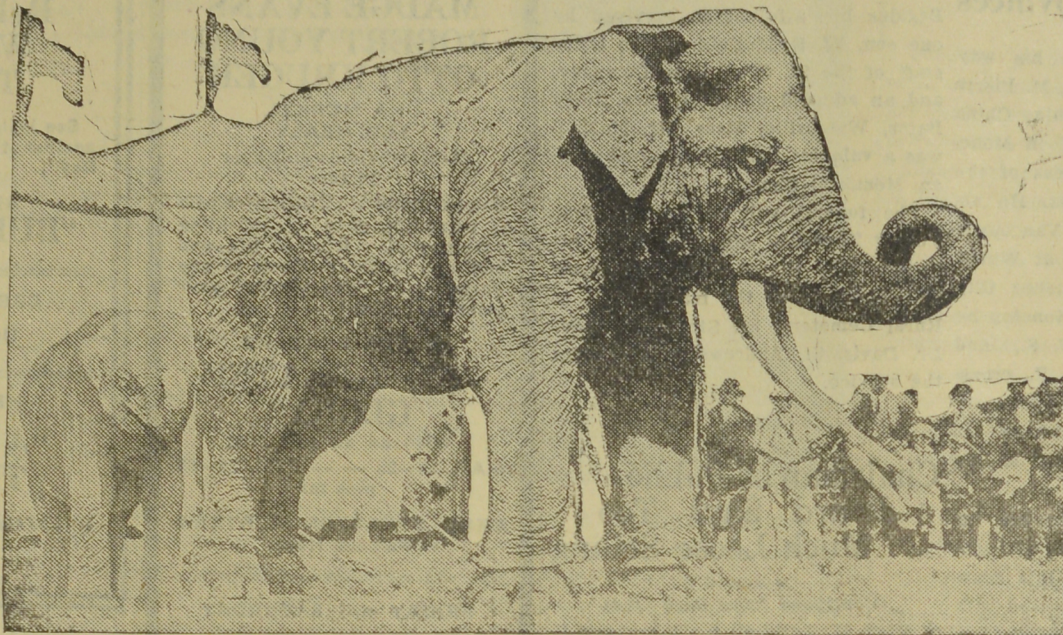

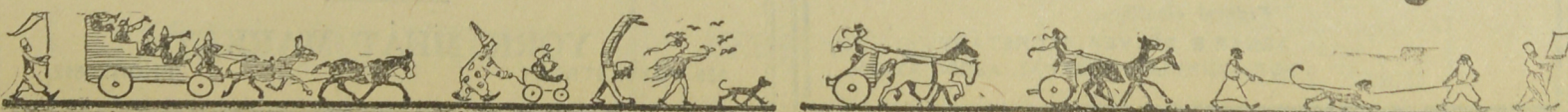

WEEK END GUESTS

Plan Menus Before Visitors Arrive — Dress Up Leftovers For Main Course at Luncheon and Rely on Unusual Dessert for Festive Touch

One thing that adds inestimably to the homemaker's enjoyment of the role of hostess to house guests is to plan, before their arrival, the menus for the entire visit. Besides saving many a flustered minute, it is the most economical way to entertain. Use up leftovers at luncheon whenever there are any and rely on an unusual dessert or hot biscuit or something special to make the meal festive.

Left-over chicken, for instance, goes into stuffed tomatoes. Combine the finely chopped meat with rice, season well and moisten with chicken stock. Stuff scooped out tomatoes with mixture, cover with buttered crumbs and serve with scrambled eggs.

A fruit omelet is delicious for Sunday morning luncheon dish when there is not a left-over to be used.

Another interesting fruity main dish is a variation of a club sandwich.

Summer Club Sandwich

Hot buttered toast, cheese, bacon, pineapple, lettuce, mayonnaise.

Put a thin slice of cheese on a piece of toast and melt in broiler. Cook bacon until crisp, two slices for each sandwich. Sauté sliced pineapple in bacon fat. Put a slice of pineapple on melted cheese, cover with a leaf of crisp lettuce and add another slice of toast. Cover with lettuce leaves and on these put the bacon. Spread with mayonnaise, add more lettuce and top with a piece of toast. Serve with pickles.

Filled Cup Cakes

This dessert is a winner every time. If you have the individual baking pans to make the cake shells, well and good. If not bake cup cakes and cut out centres.

Four cake shells, 1 cup milk, 5 tablespoons sugar, 2 tablespoons cornstarch, 1-8 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 1-4 cup shredded coconut, 1 egg, 1 cup diced peaches.

Heat milk in double boiler. Mix and sift sugar, cornstarch and salt and stir in hot milk. Return to heat and cook until thick, stirring constantly. Cover and cook a few minutes longer. Cool and add vanilla and coconut. Fill cake shells with cream filling and chill in refrigerator for an hour or longer. Top with diced or sliced peaches or berries and serve.

SOME FACTS ABOUT JAMS

Jam is essentially fruit preserved by saturating all portions of the fruit with sugar syrup. Consistency and flavour are important factors. The finished product should set firm but it

should not be tough and should spread readily. Too much beating tends to impair the fruit flavour. Prolonged boiling should be avoided and there should be no delay in cooling off the finished jam.

Consistency depends on the balance between pectin, fruit acid and sugar. Investigations have shown that the amount and quality of pectin vary considerably in different fruits, but that all fruits reach their maximum pectin content at maturity. The fruit should therefore, be picked when just ripe and should be used as soon as possible. It is a common practice in jam making to add commercial pectin. This has the advantage of lessening the time of boiling necessary to obtain a good "set" and is particularly valuable for making jams from strawberries and raspberries, which are low in pectin. The role of fruit acids in jam making is two-fold. They are not only essential for the formation of a good "set" but they help to ensure sufficient sugar inversion to prevent "sandiness" from cane sugar crystallization.

Three grades of jam are made in Canada. Grade 1, or pure jam, consists of fruit and sugar only. Grades 2 and 3 may contain added fruit juice or pectin and permitted colour and preservative, provided that any added ingredients are declared on the label of the container. Corn syrup may also be used in grade 3 jam, if declared.

Chemistry plays an important part of the jam industry. Investigations in the Chemistry Division at the Central Experimental Farm have been of material value in improving methods of control.

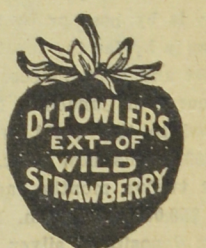
NAPKIN RINGS

Attractive little rings for holding paper table-napkins may be made from small curtain rings of about one inch in diameter. A crocheted covering of colored mercerized cotton should first be worked round the rings, and then a neat little posy of artificial flowers attached to the outer edge. The napkins should be folded in four, and then folded again diagonally so that the colored border spreads out like a fan. The ring with the posy uppermost is slipped over the folded corner. Curtain rings of a slightly larger size, similarly decorated, are dainty and convenient for the small napkins of colored linen that are so popular at present. For these the average sized silver ring is much too large. Sets of decorated rings may be made quickly and cheaply, and they are an unusual and attractive line of goods for selling at garden fetes and bazaars.

NEW ZEALAND TAKES 33 PER CENT MORE GOODS FROM CANADA

Purchases by New Zealand of Canadian goods show a 33.8 per cent increase for the first quarter of 1935 as compared with the same period last year. Principal items were newsprint, motor lorries and chassis, motor tires, rubber boots, canned fish, silk and artificial silk goods, cardboard, leather footwear, rubber heels, printing paper, insulators and fittings, wearing apparel, rubber footwear, cotton and canvas piece-goods, fur skins, machinery, iron and steel pipes and flour, a great portion of which was carried in vessels of the Canadian National Steamships in the direct Canada-New Zealand-Australia service.
