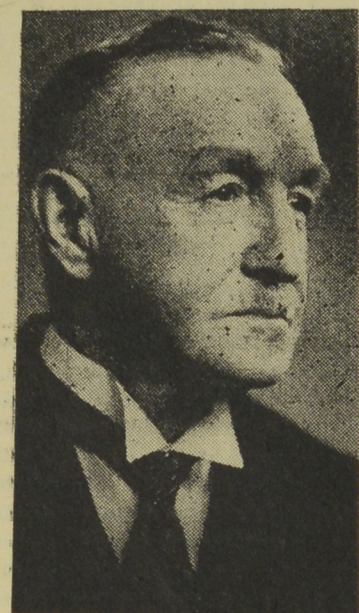

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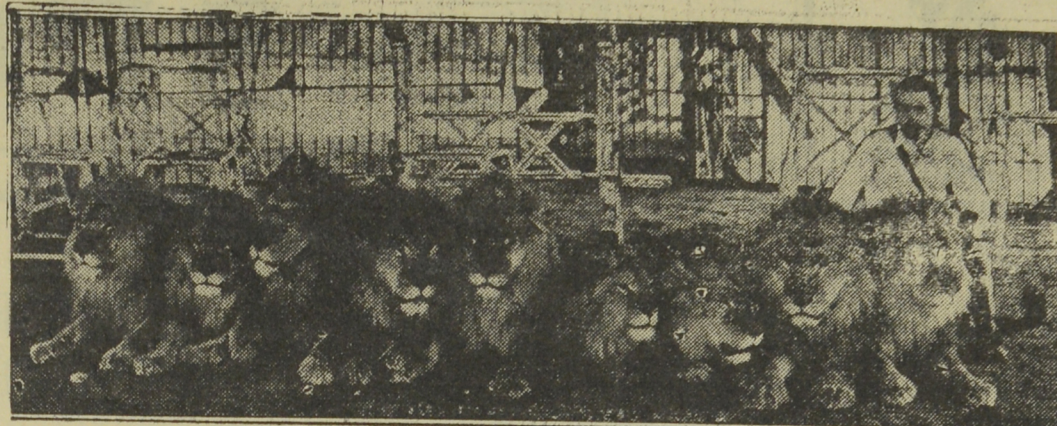
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THE AL. G. BARNES CIRCUS IS HEADED THIS WAY

OTTAWA FURTHER ASSISTS PRAIRIES

OTTAWA, Ont., July 25—Orders-in-Council authorizing one year's extension of debenture issues by Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta amounting to more than \$33,000,000, and extending relief loans for Manitoba and Saskatchewan, were made public at the office of Hon. E. N. Rhodes, Minister of Finance.

Debentures authorized for the three provinces in 1931, including \$17,809,039 for Saskatchewan, \$9,654,569 for Alberta and \$5,919,862 for Manitoba, were subsequently extended until July 1, 1935. Today a further year's extension was authorized, the debentures to be non-transferable and to bear interest at five per cent.

A loan of \$200,000 was authorized for Manitoba to help that province meet its share of June relief bearing four per cent interest payable half yearly. Saskatchewan was granted a loan of \$54,694 to cover accrued interest on loans from the Government due in July, and \$436,675 to renew loans made to that province for relief purposes.

West Indies Drawing Great Many Tourists

MONTREAL, Quebec, July 25—Tourist resorts in the Caribbean Sea and mainland have become so popular for vacation travel that the passenger traffic business of the Canadian National Steamships during the past six months reveals a marked increase in bookings from Montreal and also from Halifax over the similar period of last year, stated Victor Eke, Passenger Traffic Manager of the Canadian National Steamships.

Full cruise bookings have been the feature so far this year, showing an improvement of 12.6 per cent as an average for all passenger revenue to southern terminal points, this long distance traffic being particularly characteristic of vacation season.

FUNERAL THIS AFTERNOON

The funeral of the late Frank Bendall Boyd of Edmundston who died at the Jordan Memorial Sanatorium, River Glade, where he had been a patient for the past month, took place this afternoon from the United church of Canada at Tay Settlement. Rev. Ralph Barker conducted the funeral rites. Mr. Boyd was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. William Boyd of Tay Settlement and is survived by one brother Harry A. Boyd of Eburne, B.C.

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DYE THEIR HAIR TO MATCH FROCKS

AUTEUIL, France, July 25—The most eccentric fashions Paris has seen in years appeared today at the hurdle race which marks the apex of grande semaine—the "grand week", which winds up the Parisian social season.

Racing enthusiasts' eyes bulged when they saw women with their various heads of hair dyed blue, violet, mauve, and rich copper to match their frocks or accessories.

One Parisienne was dyed to match her vivid blue costume; another wore a sun-tanned-copper makeup to match her titian red hair.

Beaten silver slave bracelets were worn above the elbows and big, crownless felt hats with turned-up brims, rimmed at the forehead line by ostrich fringes, and other eccentricities were noted.

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TAXIMAN'S STORY MAY COST LICENSES

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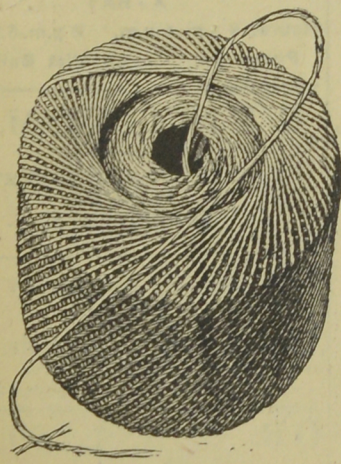
