Has toured from Kansas to Pacific Coast and in Western Canada since she was 8, principally with her sisters and parents.

Used to play second violin in the family orchestra.

Worked her way through high school entertaining at theatres and social functions, through college years singing over KSL, Salt Lake City.

Made her Columbia debut on program originating at KSL.

This won her chance to join staff of KFRC, San Francisco where Heidt met and induced her to join his Brigadiers.

The Boswell Sisters and Bing Crosby are her favorite radio artists.

Life of the Stars

BEN BERNIE

And now we're going to talk about the "Old Maestro"—Ben Bernie. Of course, you've already heard his incessant and pleasing wise-cracking, which punctuates his weekly broadcast. This, probably more than anything else, has made him one of the most popular band leaders.

At seventeen, his novel sales talk to a customer who came to buy a violin at the music store where Ben worked resulted in his signing a vaudeville contract. And he changed his real name, Ansel to Bernie. He had learned to play the violin at the age of six, in his father's blacksmith shop beneath Brooklyn Bridge, and at 13 gave a concert in Carnegie Hall. But his father insisted that he study to be an engineer and this resulted in several years at Columbia University School of Mines and Engineering and at Cooper Institute. The mistake of this soon became evident and then Bernie went into vaudeville. His first partner in a three-day act was Phil Baker and they played together from 1910 until the World War.

Admiration for Paul Whiteman inspired him to become a band leader, while he was playing vaudeville alone, doing violin solos and monologue. Paul was playing at the famous Palais Royale in New York at the time.

Buddy Clark, well-known radio and recording baritone will be heard over the WABC-Columbia network in a new series every Thursday from 7:15 to 7:30 P. M., A. S. T., beginning July 25.

Clark was a student at the Northeastern Law School in Boston, Mass., when his singing at amateur affairs won such unanimous approval that, in his third year, he abandoned law for a radio career.

He was first heard over Station WBZ in Boston and later appeared on the I. J. Fox Furrier programs over WEEI in the same city. His success led his sponsor to present him on three 15-minute periods and one half-hour program each week over Stations WEEI and WNAC, the latter going over the Yankee network of the Columbia Broadcasting System.

Last fall Clark sang with Lud Gluskin's orchestra in a series of recordings for Brunswick. Early this year he appeared as a guest artist on "The Big Show" over CBS with Block and Sully, Gertrude Niesen and Lud Gluskin's Continental Orchestra.
