O'Keefe Presents Cinderella, A La Ruse And a Chinese Stogee

Tragedy—gaunt, grim, gray, gruff, and glamorous—from the Russian steppe the Mexican hacienda and the back porch of Eugene O'Neill's walk-up will stalk across the splintered boards of Walter O'Keefe's "Five Flop Disreputary Theater" when the O'Keefe-Sorin version of Cinderella, famous folk story of an inferiority complex, is tossed across the nation via the FABC-Columbia network tonight, from 11:00 to 10:30 P. M., A. S. T.

O'Keefe, the great tragedian and mine of information from East Hartford, will present Mademoiselle Alyce Froste in a triple characterization as Cinderellavitch Boroslawsky of Zrghd, as Senorita Cindereeya of Los Toros, Mexico, and as Nina Cinderella Leeds of White River Junction, Vermont. The audience will be observed in pop bottles knitted from soft wool.

The stupendous production will be punctuated by several novel highlights. That master of dialects, "Pretty Boy" McGillicuddy Borin, will be heard as two Yankess, a Russian emigre, an old Confederate soldier, and a Roumanian gypsy in love with a Dutch waitress in Beverly Hills. O'Keefe will also feature his newly imported Chinese stogee, Bow Wow Bop Ting A-Ling, born of early Egyptian parents in the Grand Chaco country, where both sides of his family fought for fifty years for an outlook to the sea.

WJR, Detroit, Will Join Columbia Network

Station WJR, Detroit, Michigan, will become an outlet of the Columbia Broadcasting System on September 29. It was announced today by William S. Paley, President of the network. Known as "The Goodwill Station", WJR operates on a wavelength of 750 kilocycles and with a power of 10,000 watts. On joining the Columbia network, Station WJR will replace Station CKLW as the CBS outlet in the Detroit area.

"His was one of the first commercial programs", write the editors of the journal. "And with a few minor changes, that program is typical of what Haenschen is doing today.
