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## AUTOMOBILE INSURANCE ACT AMENDMENT

Corporations Committee Recommends Amendment—Premier Tilley Maintains Public's Protection.

With Premier L. P. D. Tilley declaring that the public should be protected as well as the insurance companies, the Committee on Law Practice and Procedure recommended a bill to amend the Automobile Insurance Act this morning.

Premier Tilley maintained that in the case of a man's family not being allowed to collect insurance because of drunken driving by the victim of an accident, the public should be protected. The Motor Vehicle Act would have to be amended to provide for a case of this kind.

The Dairy Products Act was again recommended by the committee. J. H. A. L. Fairweather, K. C., occupied the chair.

A bill to amend the automobile Insurance Act was first recommended by the committee. Hon. W. H. Harrison, K. C., explained the different changes.

Speaking on the matter of a man's family being prevented from collecting insurance because of drunken driving the premier, Hon. L. P. D. Tilley, K. C., stated that the public as well as the insurance companies must be protected.

J. H. A. L. Fairweather, K. C., chairman, (government, Kings), stated that the Motor Vehicle Act would have to be amended to provide for a case of that kind.

The Attorney General stated that this bill would not come into force until proclaimed and the government would have time to consider it further. Other amendments would probably be made next year, he stated.

The proposed Dairy Products Act, which had been previously recommended by the committee again today with further amendments. There was no opposition to the amendments.

## MOUNT ALLISON BILL TODAY WAS RECOMMENDED

Dr. George J. Trueman, president, of Mount Allison University, in speaking before the Corporations Committee, stated that the Mount Allison bonds had been sold on the assurance that the University would bend every effort to secure the government's guarantee. Dr. Trueman explained that this guarantee would make bonds more saleable. The bill was recommended by the committee with Hon. G. H. I. Cockburn in the chair.

A bill entitled an act to incorporate the Maria F. Ganong Old Folks Home which was referred for future discussion last Tuesday was recommended with a few amendments.

A. R. McKenzie and Samuel A. McBride, St. Stephen, appeared with W. J. West, Fredericton, and explained that the home would not admit more inmates than the revenue could maintain.

An act to extend the powers of the Madawaska Log Driving Company (of Maine) to the provincial waters of the Saint John River above Grand Falls, was referred to private session.

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## MOTOR VEHICLE LICENSES VALID UNTIL APRIL 30

A further extension of one month's duration on all motor vehicle licenses and operators' licenses issued in the Province of New Brunswick in 1934 was announced today by Hon. D. A. Stewart, Minister of Public Works. The period of grace, previously announced to expire on March 31st has today been extended until April 30th.

"The apparent lateness of the opening of the motoring season," said Hon. Mr. Stewart, "has made this second extension advisable. While a good many drivers can and must use motor vehicles in city traffic, few if any would feel disposed to take out new licenses before the last of April."

At the same time it has been made known that the province will again grant credit to owners of commercial trucks licensing their vehicles with the Motor Vehicle Branch of the Department of Public Works. Payment of 50 per cent of the total cost of registration will entitle the owner of a commercial truck to operate his machine on the highways of the province until July 1st. Failure to pay the balance of the registration and license fee before or upon the date stated will result in repossession of the plates by the Motor Vehicle Branch.

This credit arrangement was an experiment by the department last year. Its continuation is prompted by the manner in which owners of commercial trucks in New Brunswick met their responsibilities at that time.

This does not apply to passenger vehicles, public carriers of freight or passengers, convertible vehicles, service cranes, etc., but only to commercial vehicles.

Premier's visit to England. After the Premier's return he had immediately raised the stumpage which would prohibit the lumber cut.

Mr. Tilley claimed that he did not raise the stumpage that he restored it and he explained how the stumpage worked out. This has already been reported in the press.

Mr. Tilley referred to the strike in Mr. Anderson's mill which had been settled by himself (Tilley) after Mr. Anderson had got into difficulties with his men.

Mr. Tweedie failed to see any results from the Premier's trip to England. Lumber buyers from the Old Country, he said, had been coming to this country for years and years. The difference of \$1.50 stumpage over that in Quebec he said, had hurt our lumber operators. At a lower stumpage the government would have got the same revenue as more lumber would have been cut and more men would have been employed.

After considerably more cross firing between the Opposition members and the Government members and supporters the House adjourned until today.


