## "Say It With Music" Features War Medley

London, "Say it with Music," will be heard tonight at 9.05., AST, on the Eastern and Midwest network, will present his arrangement of "A Canadian in the Great War" which had its premiere on this same program last Armistice Day.

The musical picture of war time with the Canadians is being presented in honour of the 71st Battalion which celebrates the anniversary of its sailing for overseas on the 29th of March. The program will be dedicated to the Woodstock reunion, and it is expected that Mickey Francis will again be featured in the music hall number.

## Famous Vocal Artist On Windsor Program

Jack Radford has secured another internationally known vocalist for his Windsor presentation, "Curtain," to be heard on the Canadian Radio Commission's Eastern network tonight at 8.00 p.m. Templeton Moore, the celebrated tenor, who is favorably known on both sides of the border and who has added greatly to the prestige of Windsor's musical reputation, will be featured on the program. Mr. Moore has chosen for his numbers "Collette" by Parker, "Lorraine" by Sanderson and "Irish Emigrant" by Lady Dufferin.

Commenting on the fine concert performance of this artist, Augustus Bride, distinguished critic, said: "He is that rare avis, a pure tenor, much of the Robert Hyslop variety; of lyric quality, but with heroic strains in it."

Pearl Kendrick will accompany Mr. Moore and will also be heard in two piano solos.

"Neapolitan Nights" has been chosen for Lorne Hitchins Banjo Trio as their opening number on the program and Edith Morley, soprano will be heard with the mandolas in a beautiful arrangement of "Drink to Me Only With Thine Eyes." Grace Needham, whose popular numbers are a hit of this clever little program feature, will be heard in "I'm Growing Fonder of You" with Russ Gerow's orchestra. The vocal trio and orchestra will also present "Whose Honey Are You" and the banjo boys will give their interpretation of "Put On An Old Pair of Shoes."

## Bach Anniversary Program To Be Presented Tonight

Tonight, a performance celebrating the 250th anniversary of Bach's birth will be given by the Bach Society of Toronto with Reginald Stewart conducting. The performance will be given in the Long Gallery of the Art Gallery of Toronto and will be broadcast by the Canadian Radio Commission on the National network from 10.30 to 11.00 p.m., AST.

The work to be given is the opera, "Phoebus and Pan," which as far as can be ascertained, has never been performed in Canada before. This charming opera bouffe is one of the few secular works which Bach has left and it reveals this greatest of all composers in a mood unfamiliar to most people who think of him only as a writer of religious music.

"Phoebus and Pan" is full of harmony and charm. The story, founded on the old Greek myth, deals with the competition for musical supremacy between Phoebus, the God of the Lyre, and Pan with his rustic pipe. Phoebus, standing for all that is best in music, is Bach himself, while Pan represents the light opera composers of that period.

In addition to the famous Bach Choir and a small Chamber orchestra, a number of prominent singers will fill the principal roles, including J. Campbell-McInnes, Mrs. Allan McLean, Pear Whitehead, Heber Mulock, Lawrence DeFoe and George Lambert.


