

## REVISION OF POLL DISTRICTS FOR ELECTION

Major J. S. Scott Announces Electoral Polling Districts

Total Voters 23,599

Provincial List Shows a Difference of 200 from Dominion List

Major John S. Scott, secretary-treasurer for York county announced today that revision of the different polling districts for the electoral district of York and Sunbury counties, which will be revised dating from May 15 to July 1, will be as follows:

E. S. L. Hall, McAdam Junction, Friday, June 21; County Court House, Fredericton, all other week days.

The total number of eligible voters in York and Sunbury counties, according to dominion polling figures, will be 23,599. This total is made up of 19,406 for York County and 4,193 for Sunbury county.

The number of voters in polling division No. 1, Fredericton (up town) is 2,774, while in division No. 2 Fredericton (down town) the number of 2,647.

Major Scott pointed out today that the provincial list shows some discrepancy from that of the Dominion list, being about 200 voters less for the York-Sunbury district.

## FOX INDUSTRY INCREASING IN THE DOMINION

George W. Chapman, of This City Relates the Growth of Industry

Exports Increased

Industry Has Gained Over a \$1,000,000 In Year's Period

How the silver fox industry in the Dominion of Canada has grown in recent years, with its corresponding growth in this province, was pointed out today by George W. Chapman, head of the fox firm of W. T. Chapman and Sons, of Salisbury, N. B. Generally the export trade in force has increased close to a million dollars in a period of over a year.

From the Dominion Statistics on foxes, Mr. Chapman uncovers that the export value of Silver foxes at the latest report was five million dollars. Ten years ago the export trade was less than a million dollars. Two years ago it was less than four million.

It is interesting to know that between fifteen and twenty per cent of the latest figures on export business, represents the value of New Brunswick skins on the market.

It is also well to know, said Mr. Chapman, that the top price for silver fox pelts from this province at the last statistical report was \$125, and since those figures were made known several New Brunswick fox pelts have sold in excess of that amount.

### Facts of Interest

Some other facts of interest to the man interested in this industry are not out of place. Over one hundred thousand silver foxes—the silver fox represents almost ninety nine per cent of all foxes raised in Canada—are born in Canada each year. The value of property devoted to fox ranching in the Dominion is given out as nearly twelve million dollars. These foxes are valued at between six and seven million dollars. The export value of silver foxes is more than three times the value of any other class of furs.

One thing that is especially interesting, thinks Mr. Chapman, is that 83,000 skins were sold in the London market in January, 1935, sales. Of this total eighty six per cent were disposed of.

The estimated number of foxes born in 1935 is estimated to be between 300,000 and 350,000. The uses of silver foxes has increased, scarves and capes now being used more widely than ever before.

### FUNERAL OF STANLEY DOUGLASS

The funeral of the late Stanley Douglass, Sr., whose death occurred here on Monday, will take place tomorrow afternoon with service at Christchurch Cathedral at 2 o'clock by Very Rev. J. H. A. Holmes and interment will be made in the Rural cemetery extension. Howard Douglass, a son, and a school teacher at Grand Manan, is expected to arrive here this evening, and Stanley Douglass, Jr., who been in the West Indies, is expected here this evening. Dr. Ellen Douglass, a sister, of Winnipeg, arrived here on the noon train today and Mrs. Fred Harrison, of Clova, Que., a daughter, is already here.

It is expected that a number of former friends of the deceased from Stanley will be here tomorrow for the funeral. The late Mr. Douglass after leaving high school attended the University of New Brunswick and many of those who were fellow students will be sorry to hear of his death. He was a former member of the York County Council and after arriving in Fredericton was appointed a member of the board of school trustees.

## RESIDENCE WAS BURNED IN SOUTH DEVON TODAY

Home of Mrs. A. Morehouse, Marysville Rd., Guttled by Flames

Barn Was Saved

Damage Said \$5,000; Firemen Under Difficulties

Fire which originated in a chimney blaze swept through the residence owned by Mrs. Avery Morehouse situated on the Marysville road, this morning, and burnt the building to the ground. The efforts of the Devon fire fighters who fought under difficulties, proved unavailing. The damage was estimated this afternoon at close to \$5,000.

Mrs. Morehouse, who occupied the building with her son, A. E. Quartermain, and who has been in ill-health for the past few weeks, was carried from the building and taken to the home of a neighbor.

The building which is situated out of the range of the Devon fire department's facilities, was quickly razed by the flames. The fire fighters resorted to throwing pails of water and snow on the barn and in this way were able to keep the flames from doing damage there. The house, however, was completely enveloped in flames in a short time and it was impossible to do anything save watch it burn.

Pieces of furniture from the Morehouse residence were salvaged.

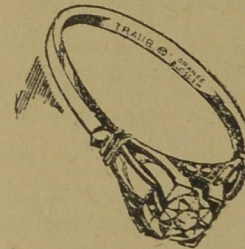
