question of a national magazine for teachers is being studied by a committee which will report to the federation's convention next year.

The case of a teacher who advertised in the daily press for a position promising to refund to the churches of the district the sum of \$100 from the salary came in for much criticism and the following resolution was unanimously passed: "That the Teachers' Association record its strong disapproval of the action of any teacher in having an understanding with any school board whereby the minimum salary act may be circumvented, such action not being in keeping with the standard of ethics demanded of the teaching profession."

Mr. Rouse outlined a plan for the training of teachers for rural schools. He suggested that the student teacher should spend some time, perhaps five or six weeks, in rural schools, near his or her home, and there conduct the school under the supervision of the regular teacher. He or she would then return to Normal School to complete his or her course. He asked that the members consider it and be prepared to express an opinion later on the merits or demerits of the proposition.

CLASSES LARGE

Over 550 students are registered at the Fredericton High School this year, it was announced today by O.V.B. Miller, principal. Of these 92 are registered in the pre-vocational and technical classes, 75 in the commercial department and the remainder in the academic department. The High School orchestra held its first practice the other day and a large number of old members and many new members attended. The High School will also have a band this year. It was announced today by C. B. Burden, director of the orchestra. It is understood that Mr. Burden will direct the band also.

TO CHARLOTTETOWN

Mr. and Mrs. V. A. Ainsworth left today for Charlottetown, P.E.I., where Mr. Ainsworth, formerly manager of the Fredericton branch of the Maritime Electric Company, has been transferred. Many social functions were held recently in their honor and their departure from this city will be regretted by a large circle of friends. On Saturday Mr. Ainsworth was presented a combination cigarette lighter and case by F. L. Cooper on behalf of the Rotary Club of which he is a member.

WATER REMAINS STATIONARY

The water in the Saint John River did not rise any over the weekend it was announced today by John Malloy, superintendent of the pumping station. It still remains at about eight inches above dead summer level. There is still a large quantity of pulpwood floating down the river and people are still sacking it along the shore. At present there are no regular driving crews looking after the pulpwood, but it is expected that there will be a crew on as soon as the water rises more.

FRATERNITY MEETING

The Sigma Lambda Beta Rho Society held its first meeting of the season in the Lady Beaverbrook's Residence yesterday. Previous to the regular meeting there was a meeting of the class representatives to the society at which they elected Herbert Wallis, Montreal, president of the Society, and Allan Glennie, St. John, secretary-treasurer. Following the election of the officers the society took up routine business.

SALMON SEASON CLOSES

The salmon season in the province closed in all waters today except the Nashwaak, Cain's Rivers and Tabusintav. According to Bill Griffin, well-known guide, the September run of salmon was the best in years this year.

**LIBERALS HAVE
BIG MEETINGS
IN COUNTY**

Large enthusiastic meetings were held in the interests of the Liberal party, Saturday night at Posterville and Parker's Ridge. At both places, the halls were packed. At Parker's Ridge, the speakers were P. Desautels, Frank Osborne and Ralph Gunter, M. P. P. At Posterville the speakers were W. G. Clark, Stewart Durling, M. P. P., Ernest Stairs, M. P. P. and Donald Duffy.

Speaking at Parker's Ridge, H. Ralph Gunter stressed the plight of the lumbering industry. He said that lumber yards were being loaded up with surplus lumber. We can not sell on the foreign markets to any great extent. The United States is one of our most logical markets. Until we open up the U. S. market, we cannot hope to get very far. We need trade.

Mr. Desautels said that our trade had been dropping off. Under the Liberal regime, we have had more prosperous times. The trade always increased. When we have low tariffs, we have better business conditions, and the opposite applies when we have high tariffs.

Mr. Osborne said that the marketing board was a failure insofar as our farmers in the Maritimes are concerned. We could not get markets in Ontario. With regard to the railways, he claimed that over sixty thousand men have been forced into the ranks of the unemployed. The Liberal party will not stand for any amalgamation of the C. P. R. and the C. N. R. With increased trade under Liberal policies, Mr. Osborne maintained that more men could be employed.
