

ELECTION DAY AT MARYSVILLE, MUCH INTEREST

Eligible Voters Number
285; 90 p.c. Expected
To Vote

Contest In Two Wards

Pettigrove and Fletcher
In Ward 1; Moore and
O'Donnell in Ward 3

Today is election day in the town of Marysville with a contest in two wards and a great deal of interest shown. J. L. Fletcher is opposing Ald. Horace H. Pettigrove in Ward 1, and Howard O'Donnell is opposing Alderman William Moore in Ward 3.

Mayor J. Walter Walker, who is commencing his fifth term as mayor uncontested this year, said this morning that of the total of 285 eligible voters, about 90 per cent. are expected to vote today.

Returning Officers

The final time for voting is at 4.30 o'clock. Voting is taking place at two places, with Eldon Peterson returning officer for the west side, and Fred White the returning officer for the east side of the river. More interest has been manifest this year than during any recent years.

While there are contests in Wards 1 and 3, Ritchie Gorman in Ward 2, and Marvin W. Minue in Ward 4 have taken office for the ensuing year by acclamation.

Speaking with a Daily Mail reporter today His Worship declared that so far the origin of the fire is unknown, though it is supposed that the fire broke out in the basement of the Bank of Nova Scotia building.

ZERO WEATHER

A temperature of 8 below zero occurred here this morning in the wake of continued cold weather. The last week or so has been more typically January weather than at any time this month. Generally, January has been quite mild compared with last year and there have been no less than two big thaw periods. A quite heavy snowfall occurred today and milder weather was indicated for over the week-end.

SATURDAY MARKET

Today's Phoenix Square market was a fairly large one with produce quite plentiful and prices quite similar, possibly a little cheaper than on Wednesday. The prevailing prices were as follows: Pork, 10 to 12 cents per lb. Butter, 25 cents per pound; eggs, 35 cents per dozen; beef, 4 to 6 cents per pound; lamb, 12 to 15 cents per pound; pork, 14 to 17 cents per pound; potatoes, 75 cents per barrel; wood, \$4. to \$8. per barrel.

IS SERIOUSLY ILL

Mr. Grannen suffered a severe illness last winter from which he never fully recovered, complications having developed so that his condition is giving his family considerable anxiety. For many years Mr. Grannen has given valuable service as fire captain and his illness will be learned with general regret in this city. This afternoon his condition was reported as critical.

It is also understood that after taking office the new lieutenant governor will go into residence at "Acacia Grove," the property of Mrs. A. J. Gregory on Waterloo Row in Fredericton's fashionable east-end section.

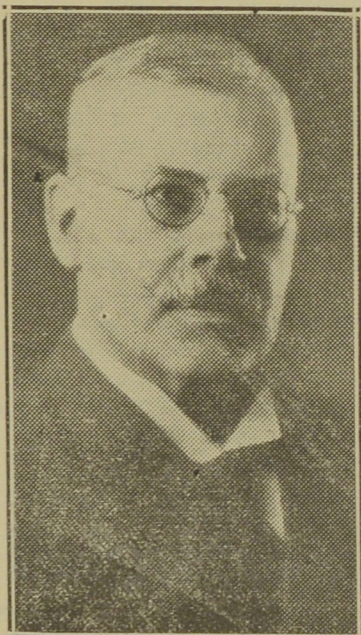
Personal Friends

The work was completed last week by employees of the New Brunswick Electric Power Commission after a few days' work. The distance which will be now supplied by the electric service covers almost two miles.
