In one of the most sweeping victories since Confederation the Liberal party was yesterday swept into power. Mackenzie King, who again becomes Premier of Canada, will have at his back a much stronger majority than Premier Bennett could count on in the previous Parliament. The Maritime Provinces were practically unanimous in favor of Laberal Government. Only one seat in the three provinces down here by the sea went Conservative.
