## PUSIE BACK WITH CANUCKS JENKINS TRADED

MONTREAL, Oct. 15 — Jean the "Great Pusie" the harlequin of hockey comes back to Canadiens. Along with Walter Buswell he was "traded" for Roger Jenkins yesterday. The Boston club also gets cash in the transaction. Both Pusie and Buswell are French Canadians and their acquisition splashes Canadiens with plenty of color.

Pusie is one of the funny men of hockey but he has promised already that he will be "very serious" in his efforts with Canadiens. He is noted for his tendency to stir up fights with opposing players and his battle with Elbie Goodfellow when he was with Rangers is still referred to as one of the best "box office" fights ever staged in the Garden.

"If there is a fight I will of course be in there." The great Pusie never passes up a chance to punch or wrestle. If those Maroons get tough with this boy they will get a bang punch away will go Pusie," he remarked though he predicted he would show that he has finally arrived at the top.

Buswell played for years for St. Francis Xavier. He has been with Detroit the past few years, was recently traded to Boston in the Barry-Weiland deal. So he comes back to the club that would have had him long ago had the American Association not broken away from NHL affiliation. He broke in with Chicago Shamrocks and has played a steady defensive game for the past few years. He is a fine stickhandler and reminds in his actions of George Boucher when the latter was in his prime.

Pusie was with Canadiens for a while then gravitated to the coast league where he was leading scorer. He had a trial with Rangers, was traded to Boston and with Cubs last year he was one of the big attractions of the Canam League due to his propensity to start fights.

Billy Boucher will have a number of fine amateur prospects under his wing when Canadiens go to Quebec. Rod Lorrain of Ottawa a speedy skater, Len Godin, Kirkland Lake, a hard body checker, Leon Gagnon, brother of the Black Cat, Jean Bourcier, of Verdun, Gaston Trudel, Shawinigan Falls, Jack Moussette, Hull, Jimmy Orlando, Vics, Aurel Legris, Babe Tapin, Gerald Brodeur of Quebec, and Pete Jotkus, is another who will try out with Canadiens.

They will also have Camillien Houde who comes from Shawinigan Falls. He is no relation of the mayor and others. The team will no doubt carry about ten or eleven French-Canadian players and are already assured of the Mantha brothers, Lepine, Gagnon, Larochelle, Joliat, Mondou, Buswell, Raymond and Lesieur.

## JOE LOUIS TO TOUR CANADA IN NOVEMBER

MONTREAL, Oct. 14 — Joe Louis, hailed generally as the greatest living heavyweight and, in the opinion of many critics, the greatest of all time, will undertake a tour of Canada in November, with Montreal the first city in which he will display his lethal punch and uncanny skill.

The "Club Lido" under the direction of Lou "Puggy" Dettner will promote the brief tour of central Canadian cities. Louis will perform here on Monday, November 11, and then move on to Ottawa and Toronto in turn.

The boxing displays given by the young negro giant who recently felled Primo Carnera and Max Baer in turn and who regarded as a certainty to become the next heavyweight champion of the world, will be against a variety of sparring partners, of which he will bring eight in all to Canada. But in addition, following the lines of such oldtime stars as John L. Sullivan, Jim Corbett, Kid McCoy and Jim Jeffries, Louis will in each city offer a substantial amount to any fighter who can last a round with him, an offer open to anyone with no limitations as to numbers.

This will be the first ring appearance of Joe Louis since he knocked out Max Baer, former champion, in such devastating fashion in New York a few weeks ago.

Louis Dettner is a well-known Montreal sportsman, former featherweight and lightweight amateur boxing champion of the Dominion and has always retained a keen interest in sports events.
