## DIAMOND STILL PAYS TO THE MAN WITH ABILITY

Rich Dividends Are Still Floating About For the Ball Player Who Can Climb to the Peak.

NEW YORK, April 29—Indications of how certain parts of the country have ridden out the depression may be found in the attendance figures at the big league teams' open their seasons. Owners of clubs no longer are shaking their heads. None feels that baseball will have to hearken back to the pioneering days when such an outstanding player as Larry Lajoie was paid the munificent salary of \$1,500 a year.

The old game has been a pretty generous employer and the fans have paid well to see their favorites. It must make Lajoie a bit disappointed to think that he passed out of the game of which he was a master before the days of high salaries. The great Frenchman actually jumped from the Phillies to the Athletics for an increase of \$2,500 a season.

A few years after Lajoie's days of stardom Ty Cobb came along with his 50-cent fielder's glove and his \$1,000 bat to hammer his way into \$1,000,000. That million dollar figure is an estimate of his earnings by some of Ty's friends.

Lajoie and Cobb and even Babe Ruth might be justified in being a little jealous of Dizzy Dean. The great "I" man of the Cards was picking cotton at \$1 a hundredweight only eight years ago with little hope of ever having cash enough to see a big league ball game. Dean today is making about \$75,000 a year on his baseball ability, and he is just well started on his career.

### Al Simmons' Fortune

Al Simmons had to sneak away from home and ask for a job with the Milwaukee team, because his mother was afraid baseball was not a good livelihood for a young man. Simmons has salted away \$200,000, it is reported.

One of New York's own, Lou (Iron Man) Gehrig, wasted no time dreaming about anything but baseball in his youth. Today he can look forward to a life of ease and affluence thanks to his heavy bat.

Jimmy Foxx was playing in his bare feet when Frank Baker got his first baseball job. Jimmy has been shrewd with his cash.

Then there is Goose Goslin, who has not many active playing seasons left, but will be able to retire in comfort and live in one of the show places at Salem, N. J., where he was employed as a carpenter before he discovered he could hit the leather.

Joe Cronin, just a young bridegroom now, is expected to retire some day to become a club owner, and besides that he will have a fortune earned in salary. It is said that Joe will receive 730,000 a season for five years as leader of the Boston Red Sox. His boss, Eddie Collins, made \$300,000 or more in baseball and then invested in what he declares is the best franchise in the league.

## AUSTRALIAN DAVIS CUP TEAM ARRIVES

Brookes Says Aussie Team has Good Chance In Davis Cup Play This Year.

NEW YORK, April 29—Norman Brookes, Australia's great left-handed veteran of the Davis Cup tennis wars, arrived here over the week-end on his way to England, bringing with him the prediction that Australia will win the international trophy from England this year and will do it with two men, Jack Crawford and Vivian McGrath.

Brookes, honorary captain of the team, said that Crawford, who beat Fred Perry in the 1935 Australian championships, is playing the best tennis of his career. Crawford was recognized as the world's amateur tennis champion until Perry whipped him in 1933 at Forest Hills in the final of the United States singles championship. "Perry was at his best, too," Brookes said. "Crawford should be the sensation of this year's international season."

Brookes said Crawford and McGrath have become Australia's best doubles combination and will play together as well as the singles, in cup matches.

Only once has a two-man Davis Cup team captured the trophy. Big Bill Tilden and "Little Bill" Johnson won it for the United States from Brookes and Gerald Patterson at Auckland, New Zealand, winning all five matches in 1920.

## CAREY - JACOBS COMBINE MAY RULE BOXING

Former Garden Head to Join With Jacobs To Control Boxing in New York.

NEW YORK, April 29—William F. Carey, a ruddy-faced Irishman with iron gray hair, sat in his offices today—millionaire ruler of an empire of machinery and men—and confessed himself such a hopeless fight addict that he may soon head the world's most powerful boxing corporation.

"I am considering accepting the invitation to become president of the 20th Century Club," Carey said. "It's not definite yet. I still have four days to consider."

But the twinkle in his eye, the eagerness in his voice and the presence of beaming Mike Jacobs, 20th Century treasurer, belied any uncertainty about his accepting. Chunky, semi-bald Jacobs is another fight "nut" who has enough potatoes to promote boxing as a hobby.

The alignment of these two fistic fanatics in a grand promotional venture may mark a new era in boxing, an era of "fights for the fans." Acceptance of the presidency by Carey will virtually clinch the leasing of Madison Square Garden's boxing privileges to the 20th Century Club.

Carey was treasurer and vice-president of the New Garden until Tex Rickard's death in 1929. Then he became president. He resigned the presidency two years ago after some of his employees had involved the Garden in a tax case. He is a close friend of most of the Garden directors. If the Garden decides to lease the privileges, Carey will have first call on them.

## NEW TALENT SOUGHT FOR N. Y. AMERKS

"Red" Dutton Will Seek To Build Up Team Which Usually Finishes in End of Race.

NEW YORK, April 29—A spirit of optimism totally unknown to New York American Hockey Club activities in years permeated the atmosphere over the week-end as Mervin "Red" Dutton, fiery defenceman, signed a two-year contract to manage the club amidst ballyhoo typical of major Gotham events.

Dutton signed with young Bill Dwyer, son of the club owner, other club's officials and a swarm of newspapermen and photographers bustling about. His contract calls for a substantial increase in salary over the stipend he earned as a player when he drew the National Hockey League top of \$7,500.

### Heimer As Coach

The Calgary redhead stipulated that E. R. "Rosy" Heimer, prominent in Calgary hockey circles, as coach of the Bronks of that city aid him in rebuilding and directing the Amerks. Heimer was appointed coach to handle the reins while Dutton plays on the defence. The latter, therefore, becomes the third playing manager in N. H. L. history. In 1928 Lionel Conacher, star of the Montreal Maroon rearguard, handled the destinies of the Amerks while playing a stellar defensive role. Dunc Munro also managed Maroons one season from a defence post.

Appointment of Dutton leaves the immediate hockey future of "Bullet" Joe Simpson, manager during the last two campaigns, in a cloud of uncertainty. It is understood the Selkirk Man., fisherman will continue in the employ of owner Dwyer in some capacity connected with the various race track activities of the Amerk owner.

### Seeks New Talent

Dutton will leave New York this week-end on a lengthy trip seeking new talent for the team that finished fourth in the Canadian section of the N.H.L. last season after threatening to gain a playoff berth early in the race.

The new manager expressed optimism the club would gain a play-off berth next season and his statements were echoed by the junior Dwyer and Marty Schenker, club treasurer.

Dave "Sweeney" Schriener and Lorne Carr, of Calgary; Art Chapman, of Winnipeg, and Fred Hergerts, forwards; Al Murray, defenceman, and Roy Worters, goalkeeper from Toronto, are the only players, it was reported, Dutton has decided are certain of jobs when the next season rolls around.

Red already has selected five forwards and one defenceman from the Calgary, Winnipeg and other Western Canada districts to report at the training camp at St. Paul or Minneapolis next fall. He hopes to add several others during his exploration trip while en route home from New York. He is almost certain to call at Montreal and Chicago in an effort to put over deals with Maroons and Black Hawks toward strengthening the Amerks.

### Popular Move

Selection of Dutton to succeed the famous "Bullet Joe" made an instant hit in local hockey circles. Always popular and styled "a good mixer," the impression prevailed among hockey writers today the Amerks will really go places next season. He came to the Gotham club from Montreal Maroons where he played two seasons after the old Western Canada League disbanded.
