"Six-Gun Justice" to Inaugurate New Series of Western Thrillers

"Six-Gun Justice" the first of a vivid new series of Western dramas written especially for radio presentation by Wilbur Hall, noted West Coast author and rancher, will be broadcast over the coast-to-coast WABC-Columbia network tonight from 9:00 to 9:30 P. M., A. S. T. The series, to be heard weekly at this same time, will be directed by Knowles Entrikin and to further enhance the Western background and color, Carson Robison's Buckaroos will provide incidental music for the dramatic episodes. Robison, John Mitchell, and Pearl Pickens will also be heard in various dramatic roles as the series unfolds.

The author of "Six-Gun Justice" is one of America's best known writers of Western fiction. Hall knows the West thoroughly, is an old cowhand himself, today owns a large ranch in California and has written vivid and authentic stories of the old and new West for the past twenty years. Heed as the new lives in San Francisco, but travels frequently through the West. "Six-Gun Justice", his first radio series on a coast-to-coast network, will introduce a variety of Western character, many of them based on actual personages.

Set in pre-historic days of 100,000 years ago, the "Og, Son of Fire" dramas are based on Irving Crump's story series of the same name, popular for a decade with readers of "Boys Life" Magazine. Playing the leading role of "Og" is 18-year-old Alfred Brown ex-high school football star and veteran of many Chicago amateur production.

Playing the only feminine role in the program, "Nada", is lovely Patricia Dunlap, a veteran radio actress despite her youth. With Patricia and Alfred are heard James Andelin as Og's Friend, "Ru"; Jesse Pugh as "Pong", the devil-doctor; and Reg Knorr as "Big Tooth".

Proceedings of the annual convention of the United States Chamber of Commerce in Washington, D. C., will be summarized for the WABC-Columbia audience by Merle Thorpe, editor of "Nation's Business", in three broadcasts from the Nation's capital. His schedule is tonight from 11:05 to 11:15 P. M.; Tuesday, April 30, 11:15 to 11:30 P. M., and Wednesday, May 1 from 11:05 to 11:15 P. M.

Thorpe has been editor-in-chief and general manager of "Nation's Business" official organ of the Chamber, since 1916. He is well known among economists for his work in connection with organizations such as the Missouri Valley Coast Congress, the National Journalism Congress, the President's Unemployment Relief Organization, and the Washington Bicentennial Commission. To business men everywhere he is a familiar figure through his articles in Collier's, and his books on organization and leadership in business.
