Evidently the youths had left the school early on Wednesday. Old Times Recalled

REMINISCENCES OF THE ST. MARY'S INDIAN RESERVE AND ITS INHABITANTS FIFTY YEARS AGO

(By Mrs. Susan K. Squires)

The most of the baskets around the house were made by Old Daisy. Her name was Sapier but we never called her anything but Daisy and never was a name more inappropriate. She was about as big around as a barrel. She always made me think of a line in "A Night Before Christmas" and the line was, "He shook when he laughed like a bowl full of jelly." She was always laughing and always shaking. She was a widow so she had to beg the splints she used from the men who made them. She used a great deal of sweet hay in her work as she could gather that herself. She was cute, too. She knew she would get two or three times the worth of her baskets by bringing them upstairs and selling them to my mother; so often when we children came home from school Daisy would be sitting in the corner of the kitchen with an empty basket on the floor and something to sell, which my mother did not need but which she always bought and usually gave away. Daisy would want sugar and tea and pork and tobacco and then the basket was usually filled up with cooked food from the cupboard. But I doubt if she got too much for any of her work judging by the time she put into it. My niece showed me a little keepsake that Daisy gave her when she was an old, old woman and when she said that she wouldn't make many more baskets. It was a ring made of a splint about the size of a man's finger ring and on it were strung four little baskets so small that a woman's little finger would scarcely go into them. They were woven of splints almost as fine as hairs and fine strands of sweet hay.

I remember her coming up to the house one day and taking me to task for refusing to give milk to a young Indian. We only kept one cow and I told the boy that I had no milk to spare and to go to someone who sold it. Daisy said they wanted it for the

doctor. She explained that the doctor was not a man but a tiny baby, the seventh son of a seventh son. Its fool mother had rubbed turpentine on the soft spot on its head to clean it and had taken off both hair and skin and the head was so sore that the child could not nurse. Of course I gave them the milk for a couple of weeks even if we did have to go short. The baby was George Nash's seventh son. Nash was the degenerate descendant of some of the old settlers around Grand Lake who had married a squaw. He had moved up to the Camps and his wife and children soon stirred up such a commotion that he had to get a piece of land out on the hill by the shooting range. One squaw told me that they were the worst fighters that she ever saw.

The Indian remedies were not always as harsh as the turpentine, however. An old colored woman told me how a squaw probably saved her life. I had asked her how she became lame. She told me that she fell off of a hand-sled when a child and hurt her leg. It broke out in open sores. One day a squaw came to the house and asked what was the matter with the little girl and her father showed the Indian woman her leg. She told him, "Joe, you don't do something little girl die." Then she told him to get the pitch out of the blisters on young balsam firs and to heat it thoroughly then when it was cool to drop it into the sores. Her father did as the squaw told him and the leg healed up.

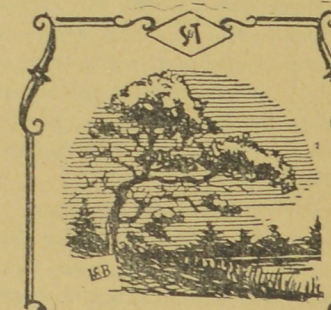

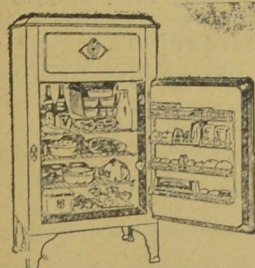
