

FINE PROGRAM CARDED FOR FAIR OPENING

Fredericton's 1935 Exhibition Officially Underway Tonight

Several Speakers

Program of Music, Addresses at Amusement Hall in Main Building

Fredericton's eighty-third exhibition will get underway this evening at eight o'clock in the Amusement hall of the main exhibition building, when a program including addresses and musical numbers will be given.

The exhibition will be officially opened by Hon. A. A. Dysart, premier of the province, and the other speakers will be Parker H. Currier, president of the Fredericton Exhibition, Ltd., and His Worship Mayor Clark, honorary vice-president. The program will also include orchestral selections, songs by Charles Johnston, numbers by the Hayden trio, and violin solos by Herbert Webber.

Expects Big Success

The anticipation of the directors is that this year's exhibition will be one of the most successful on record and the arrangements have all been satisfactorily completed. The various acts of the open air attractions are expected to arrive here tomorrow or Monday and some of the midway attractions are expected here this evening.

D. W. Griffiths, racing secretary, reported today that many of the harness racing entries have already arrived, the stables being quartered at the race tracks. Among these are the C. W. Simpson stables of Truro; J. H. Breen's stables of Halifax; H. M. Sweeney stables of Bridgewater, N. S. This morning the W. H. Keyes stables of St. Stephen, and the C. M. Alexander stables of Saint John arrived. A number of horses are expected from Prince Edward island within the next day or two.

Ben Williams of the famous Williams' midway attractions is expected here either tonight or tomorrow and will attend the fair next week, and probably the horse races.

The gates will open at nine o'clock on Monday morning with a full week of fun, entertainment and education for adults and children alike. Monday will be specially observed as Children's Day, the children of the public schools being given a half holiday.

His Honor Lieutenant Governor, Dr. Murray MacLaren will attend the fair on Tuesday along with his staff and will likely be present at the races.

The racing program for Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday will feature the largest field of horses in the history of the Fredericton track. There are a total of seventy individual entries.

E. O. MacDonald Likely Choice for York-Sunbury Candidate


Hon. H. H. Stevens, leader of the Reconstruction Party of Canada will arrive in the city at seven o'clock by motor from St. Stephen and is scheduled to address the electorate of the province of New Brunswick at 9 p.m. The party left Saint John this morning and motored to St. Andrews and St. Stephen where the leader made short addresses.

Accompanied By Son

Rev. Frances Stevens, son of Hon. H. H. Stevens, will be in the party; also Paul Cross, chairman of the Saint John Organization and another member of the Executive and a representative of the Canadian Press.

MacDonald Likely Candidate

The candidate for York-Sunbury who is already chosen but is not known to the electorate will be announced tonight at nine o'clock. E. O. MacDonald, it is expected, will be nominated and

If the law of averages of public predictions holds out he will be the candidate. Other names that have been prominently mentioned are H. H. Stuart of Fredericton Junction and George W. Chapman of Fredericton. George W. Chapman is to act as chairman tonight.

Organization Said Growing

It was stated today from the Reconstruction headquarters here that organization in Carleton, Victoria, Charlotte, Restigouche, Madawaska and Gloucester Counties is well under way. In Northumberland County Dr. Frances Fish, prominent attorney at law, is the Stevens' candidate, she being one of the first Reconstructionists nominated in Canada.

The local organization is expecting many people here from all over central New Brunswick.

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LATE SEASON SALMON ANGLING SPURRED BY RAIN

Increased Water Levels Bring Favorable Results is Report

Several Weeks Remain

Dates Dovetail With Those of N. B. Hunting Season

Recent heavy rains throughout the province of New Brunswick have done much toward the improvement of late season salmon angling. Water levels on all sporting rivers have been raised appreciably and salmon are now rising to the fly. Many excellent catches are being reported daily.

Anglers who wish to get some autumn fishing have still plenty of time to do so in New Brunswick. Closing dates on a number of the rivers of this province are still some weeks away and late comers again this year will be able to mix their fishing and hunting.

Closing Date September 15

A closing date on September 15th gives one more week of fishing on the Tobique River. On the St. John and Kennebecasis Rivers the salmon angling season runs until September 30th; on the Nashwaak, Cains, St. Croix, Magaguadavic and Digdeguash until October 15th; and on one river, the Tabusintac, the season extends until October 31st.

These dates dovetail very conveniently with those of the hunting season and thus allow visiting sportsmen to plan combination trips. The season for deer and bear opens September 15th and extends to November 30th; while that for ducks, geese and brant has the same opening date and runs through to December 31st. The partidge season this year is set for October 1st to 15th.

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
