

WINNERS I.O.D.E. BURSARIES ARE ANNOUNCED

Donald L. MacKinnon, of this City, Is One Winner
Good Student, Athlete
Miss Joan Anderson of Moncton is Other New Brunswick Winner

The I. O. D. E. bursaries have been announced, the winners being Miss Joan Winter Anderson, daughter of the late Lieut. S. Boyd Anderson, C.M.G., D.S.O., V.D., commanding officer of the Second Artillery Brigade, and Mrs. Anderson, of Moncton; also Donald Lauchlin MacKinnon, son of the late Dr. A. H. MacKinnon of Mrs. MacKinnon, of 550 Charlotte street, this city.

Dr. MacKinnon was a native of Pictou, N.S., and practiced in Bathurst, N. B. He served overseas as captain for three years with the Dalhousie Medical unit. He died of war disabilities. His wife located in Moncton, later in Fredericton, to educate her children. Donald plans to enter the University of New Brunswick, taking engineering. Later he intends to specialize in science. His earlier education was received in Bathurst, Moncton, Fredericton and Saint John. He graduated in 1935 from the Fredericton High School and his course was excellent and he was prominent in athletics, being captain of the football team in 1934-35.

The I.O.D.E. bursaries are worth \$300 per year and are tenable for four years. They are awarded yearly to sons and daughters of deceased or permanently and seriously disabled soldiers and sailors or members of the air force. Bursaries are given in order to perpetuate the memory of men and women who have given their lives in defense of the Empire in the Great War. Other divisions of war memorials are the overseas scholarships valued at \$1400 per year and the placing of historic pictures in schools. This year seventeen bursaries were awarded in Canada, two in New Brunswick, for which there were six applicants.

FLAG AT HALF MAST
The flags on the city hall and other public buildings in the city, were at half mast today in tribute to the late Queen of the Belgians, who was killed in an auto accident last week. Court mourning has been ordered to be observed throughout the British Empire.

A TRIAL SHIPMENT
The Dominion Experimental Station here has placed a number of cockerels in fattening crates in connection with a trial shipment of roasters for the British market. Several experimental stations in Canada are co-operating with the Dominion livestock branch in this experiment. The first consignment will be killed on Sept. 16, to be stored until such time as they can make entry on the British market to best advantage. The second lot will be killed so as to reach the English market for the Christmas trade.

DECORATION DAY
The Knights of Pythias, Fredericton Lodge No. 6, observed their annual decoration day services on Sunday, decorating the graves of departed comrades. The ceremony included a parade from the K. P. hall on Queen street. A special ceremony took place at the Rural Cemetery with Adjutant Kinnis of the Salvation Army. The memorial service was conducted at the grave of the late Kenneth C. White. The graves of departed comrades were decorated also by the Sons of England and Daughters of England.

PROMINENT NEWSPAPER MAN
Amongst the visitors in this city today with the party of Rt. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, is Robert J. Lipsett, of the Montreal Star, and of the Press Gallery, Ottawa. Mr. Lipsett, who is a former Calgary newspaper man, is one of the leading members of the press gallery and a writer of considerable fame. Mr. Lipsett tells The Daily Mail that the late William Lipsett, formerly of the government service was his uncle. While in this city Mr. Lipsett renewed the acquaintance of the Editor of The Daily Mail, who was a former colleague of his in Calgary in the Western boom days.

SCHOOLS REOPEN FOR NEW TERM, BIG ATTENDANCE

All Time Record for First Day Attendance At High School
P. N. S. Opening
Changes in Personnel of Teaching Staffs For New Term

Hundreds of young people flocked back into the Capital over the weekend and holiday, many of them from summer vacations, to attend the re-opening of the city schools and commence their school duties for the fall term.

From the office of R. D. Hanson, secretary of the Board of School Trustees, it was learned that an all-time record was set by the first day attendance at the Fredericton High School. A total of 537 were registered this morning. In the academic department there are 382; in the commercial, 74, and in the industrial department, 81.

In the public schools there were no fewer than 182 permits issued to all grades. Of the total, 135 were permits to pupils for Grade One, while the remaining 47 were for Grades from One to Eight. There were considerably more permits issued this year than last year. It was reported by the school authorities that there is a larger number of families moving to this city. Sixteen of the permits are for High School students from outside the city who have recently moved here.

P. N. S. Opening
Dr. H. H. Hagerman, principal of the Provincial Normal School, announced this morning that a total of 254 students had registered this morning, 60 of whom were male students. A number were unable to get here for opening day through illness, etc., but will arrive later and will likely swell the attendance to something like 265 students for the school year. This number is slightly less than last year. Teachers who all present this morning. Organization of classes was begun at once.

A number of changes have been necessary in the personnel of the teaching staffs of the various schools, the changes being particularly applicable to the High School. At the High School, Miss Doris Saunders replaces the late Miss Clair Douglass; Miss MacRae has been given a year's leave of absence; Lawrence Hashey has been given Miss MacRae's classes; Miss Pearl Ross of the Vocational department has been given Mr. Hashey's classes; and Charles Simms will take over Miss Ross' classes. In the grade schools, Miss Kate McCann, who has retired, will be replaced by Miss Elizabeth Walker in Grade III of Smythe Street School. Miss Margaret Elliott of this city will take over Grade VI of Smythe Street School for one year, succeeding the late Miss Louise Kinghorn, who passed away last week.
