NEW YORK, April 11—Countess Olga Albani, popular radio soprano, will be the guest soloist with Frank Black's ninety piece vocal and instrumental ensemble on The Pause That Refreshes on the Air broadcast over an NBC-WEAF network on Friday, April 12, at 11.30 p.m. A.S.T.

Countess Albani, who is making a special trip from Chicago to New York to participate in the broadcast from the NBC Radio City studios, will have one solo in each of the two fifteen minutes of unbroken melody which make up the half hour broadcast.

## "Say It With Music" Stars "Beautiful Lady"

One of the loveliest songs of the musical comedy stage will be featured by Russ Gerow on the popular London feature, "Say It With Music," which will be broadcast on the Eastern and Midwest network tonight at 9.05 p.m., A.S.T. Mr. Gerow has written a brilliant arrangement of "Beautiful Lady," the star song of "The Pink Lady" which first scored nearly twenty years ago.

Almost anything pleasant can be said with music. Another novelty on this same program will be the opening number in which the director again stars as arranger and tells the story in words and music why fiddlers are so universally popular with the radio audiences.

Following this novelty will be the Banjo Trio, courtesy of Lorne Hitchens in "One Night of Love." Mr. Hitchens will play a banjo solo "Southern Echoes," and Grace Needham will be featured in the vocal presentation of "According to the Moonlight" from George White's 1935 Scandals. The mandolas will be heard in the snappy Tango Della Rose.

## Overture From Famous Opera Feature on Air

Music from the greatest comic opera of the early Nineteenth Century will be played by Alexander Chuhaldin and his Melodic Strings over the National network of the Canadian Radio Commission tonight at 11.00 p.m., A.S.T. Chuhaldin has chosen the Overture from "The Diavolo" to open the program, and this is the jolly introductory music to the opera which is said to have been the most charming thing that the French musical spirit of the period has produced. "Fra Diavolo" had its premiere in Paris in 1830.

"Melodic Strings" will also include on this interesting broadcast which has a National audience in Canada as well as in the U.S., works by Geminiani and O'Donnell.

Geminiani is represented by Concerto Grosso in C Minor, Opus 2, No. 2 and O'Donnell is honoured with his graceful "Miniature Suite."
