With impressive ceremony, Rev. R. J. Kirkland was inducted as pastor of the Presbyterian Church at Harvey yesterday. Many ministers took part in the ceremony, including Rev. Dr. George E. Ross, pastor of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church here, and also Rev. S. J. Macarthur, of this city, missionary-at-large for the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

Rev. Mr. Kirkland was inducted by Rev. W. Fitzsimmons, Moderator of the Saint John Presbyterian Church, and Rev. Dr. Ross of this city delivered the charge to the newly-inducted minister.

THOMAS A. NILES DIED SUDDENLY LAST EVENING

Had Lived in This City
Fifty Years and Held
Public Positions

Respected By All

Helped To Build C. P. R.
Lines in the West In
Early Days

All our citizens who knew Thomas A. Niles, Municipal Home commissioner, will learn of his death with regret. Mr. Niles was a native of Prince William and had been a resident of Fredericton for nearly fifty years and had been a good citizen, popular with everybody. He had not been in good health for some time but his passing away last night after only a few days' illness was a distinct shock.

After coming to Fredericton Mr. Niles was for a time in the trucking and transfer business and later conducted a steam laundry business for several years. Retiring from the laundry business, Mr. Niles was appointed Municipal Home commissioner. He held this position for about fifteen years and gave the public general satisfaction. He was also chief fur stamper in the Department of Lands and Mines for the Province. In all his duties as a public official and as a citizen he was highly respected by everyone with whom he came in contact.

When just a youth Mr. Niles was engaged in railway construction work in the West at a time when the late Contractor Kitchen took a number of Kingsclear and Prince William men into the North West Territory to put the Canadian Pacific Railway across the prairies and across the Rockies.

The late Mr. Niles was a charter member of the I. O. O. F. of this city and his funeral on Friday afternoon will be conducted under the auspices of that Order. Service will be conducted at his late home, 212 Saunders street by Rev. G. W. Guion, pastor of the Brunswick Street Baptist Church. Interment will be made at the Rural Cemetery.

Mr. Niles, who was seventy years of age, is survived by his wife and one son, Horace L. Niles; three daughters, Misses Effie, Cora and Hazel; also two sisters, Mrs. Samuel Kitchen and Mrs. Charles McQuarrie, both of this city, and three grand-children.

RIVER RISE IS SUDDEN IN LAST SEVERAL DAYS

Expect Break-up of Ice
Within Period of Two
Weeks Now

Thirteen Inch Rise

Opinion Is That Ice Will
Not Run Out Until
Last of April

A thirteen-inch rise in the water at this point was the first major indication that the ice in the St. John River here is beginning to be softened and rotted, preparatory to the general breakup.

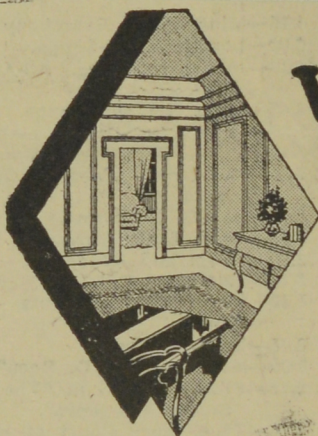
It was anticipated here today by officials of the pumping station, that the breakup will occur within three weeks, but that it will take at least two more weeks before the ice will be rotted to any extent. The sudden rise in the water within the last twenty-four hours, was the first substantial sign of the approaching breakup of any this year. For the past several weeks, under the influence of cold raw weather, the water has remained very low.

In the meantime stream drivers are busily engaged with the spring operations on the banks of the rivers, awaiting the running out of the ice. It is reported that the "driving" this year will entail thousands of cords of lumber and the a great number of men will be employed.

The ice in the river front here remains solid and reliable for traffic. Only in rare places is it weak and there have been a few near accidents.
