Mrs. Vanderbilt
Leaves Millions

NEW YORK, N. Y., July 23—The will of Mrs. Virginia Fair Vanderbilt, who died July 7, was filed in Minto, Long Island, yesterday, disposing of an estate valued conventionally at more than \$20,000. The document provides for a number of trust funds, however, indicating that the estate actually amounts to several millions.

The will dated June 5, 1930, names Mrs. Vanderbilt's former husband, William K. Vanderbilt co-executor with a bank. He is referred to as "the father of my three children", and is not mentioned in any other part of the testament.

Jewelry, table silver, and "automobiles are left to a daughter, Muriel Vanderbilt (Phelps) of Middletown, R. I., who also is to receive \$75,000 annually under a trust fund.

Another trust fund, to produce \$150,000 annually, is provided for a second daughter, Consuelo Vanderbilt Smith. The latter receives in addition jewelry, a Long Island Country estate and the Manhattan own home in which Mrs. Vanderbilt died.

An annual income of \$50,000 under a third trust fund was provided for a son, William K. Vanderbilt, Jr., who was killed in an automobile accident in the South last fall.

Servants and friend were bequeathed amounts ranging downward from \$10,000.

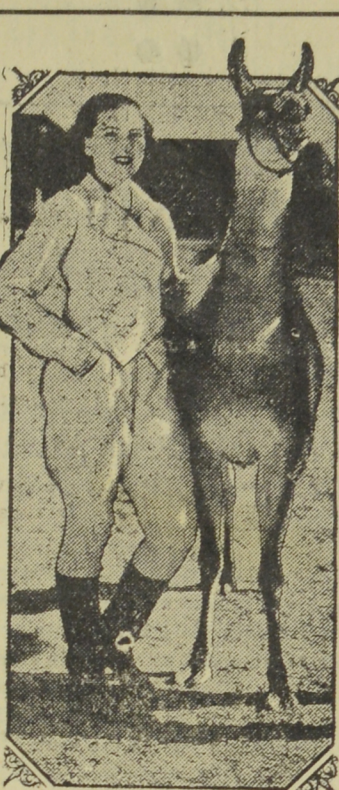

Six Million May
Vote in the Next
Federal Election

OTTAWA, July 24—Voters lists for the federal election will be completed August 15, it was announced today by Col. John Thompson, Dominion franchise commissioner. Following the recent revision, they are being printed at the government bureau at the rate of ten ridings daily.

The lists will show six million men and women eligible to vote, an increase of 250,000 over the basic lists last year. It will be the first election in Canada where a basic list has been used.

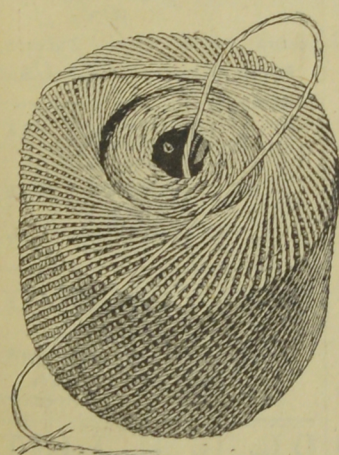
