Saint John Beat
Toronto in Tribute

Requests have been received by the Radio Commission for a repetition of the especially composed Jubilee lyric "Let Us Sing Unto Their Majesties", which was heard in a Commission Jubilee broadcast from Toronto on May 3, and again on May 6. The words of this patriotic song were written by James Kennedy and the music by Peter Maurice. Although Toronto claimed the credit for being first to put "Let Us Sing Unto Their Majesties" on the air, it develops that the Queen City may have been beaten a few hours by another Loyalist community, Saint John, N. B. The song was part of a program broadcast locally in Saint John on the afternoon of May 3 and was sung by the choir of the King Edward School with 100 voices. This was in a special Jubilee program. Saint John is proud of having been first to broadcast this tribute to Their Majesties.

Ernie Magann
Presents Song That
Composer Taught Him

Ernie Magann, who will again present his "Paradise Islanders" in a program of sweet Hawaiian melodies for the Mideast network audiences of the Canadian Radio Commission tonight, at 6:30 P. M., A. S. T., will feature a novel number in "My Queen of the South Sea Isles".

This tuneful number, the work of a native composer, was taught to Ernie by the author several years ago. It is a bright, syncopating rhythm intended for the Hula Dance and has quaint and amusing verses which will be vocalized.

The Hawaiian group will also present two Johnny Noble hits, "My Little Grass Shack" and "My Little Grass Skirt", specially arranged by Magann, and the lovely "Maui Chimes" which will feature a guitar solo. Every Magann program has two or more native songs to add the plaintive melancholy note of all real south sea music. This feature is proving one of the most popular of the Commission's summer features from Toronto.

Many prominent personages who have heretofore manifested pronounced hesitancy about appearing on regular radio programs are showing a change in attitude since the new feature "Sound Behind the Headlines" has been heard over the Mutual Broadcasting System.
