Austrians Thwart New Nazi Scare

VIENNA, June 17—Another Nazi scare prompted Austrian police to take precautionary steps yesterday toward preventing any action against the Government in the next few days. Secret police agents reported that the Nazis were planning a surprise for June 17, Adolf Hitler's "name day", with the demonstration expected to reach a climax on June 20, the second anniversary of the abolition of the Austrian Nazi party.

Death of Arthur L. Burpee Shock To Residents Here

The death in the Fisher Memorial Hospital last night of Arthur L. Burpee, a member of the firm of Corkey and Burpee, who conduct the Carlisle Hotel in Woodstock and the Queen Hotel in this city, was a shock to friends here as well as in Carleton County. Mr. Burpee was manager of the Carlisle hotel in Woodstock.

The late Mr. Burpee was well-known in this city and was a former employee of John Palmer Company, Limited. Mrs. Charles K. Palmer and Mrs. Jane Brewer of this city are aunts.

Mr. Burpee was injured last week in a car crash near Canterbury which also resulted in injuries to J. Laggie Ross, Mr. and Mrs. Bert Reed, Winston Reed, and William Reed. Mr. Burpee suffered a broken knee cap and was severely bruised and shaken up. His condition was not regarded as dangerous but on Saturday organic trouble developed and his condition becoming critical, his death occurring Sunday evening.

Coroner W. A. Kennedy was summoned and decided that an inquest would be held. He empanelled a jury, which viewed the body at the hospital and adjourned until Tuesday evening, when evidence will be taken at the Town Hall. The following are members of the coroner's jury: C. W. Clark, foreman; B. E. Cliff, G. Fred Dunham, J. D. Winslow, J. A. Troy, George Dent and Harry Patten.

Mr. Burpee had been a resident of Woodstock for the last twenty years. During most of his residence here he was in the restaurant business, in which he was associated with J. P. Corkery. In 1932, the firm leased the Carlisle Hotel, later extending their operations to include the Queen Hotel here. Mr. Corkery went to the Queen, Mr. Burpee remaining in Woodstock to conduct the house. He was a member of the Masonic order.

He is survived by his wife; his mother, Mrs. George Burpee, Centreville, and one sister, Mrs. Laura Burpee.

Funeral arrangements had not been completed last night.

Basile Brogan, also of Minto, will be charged with resisting arrest this afternoon. Amos Rankine, a fourth resident of Minto, appeared earlier this week and for being drunk was fined \$5 or 30 days' jail, and on the charge of being found guilty of obstruction was fined \$5 or given two months in jail.


