

N. B. HOLSTEIN-FRIESIAN CLUB TO MEET TOMORROW

Many Expected To Be Present at Annual Meeting Here

Extension Work Plans

C. F. Bailey, Supt. Experimental Sta. Returns From Ontario

Breeders of Holstein cattle from all parts of New Brunswick are expected in the city tomorrow to be present at the annual meeting of the New Brunswick Holstein-Friesian Club which will be held at the Experimental Station. Plans for extension work, election of officers and review of activities at the farm are on the program for Tuesday, according to an announcement today.

C. F. Bailey, superintendent of the Dominion Experimental Station, returned on Saturday from Guelph, Ontario, where last week he attended the annual meeting of the Canadian Society of Animal Production, and the Pasture Conference of officials of the Department of Agriculture, and heads of the Central Experimental Farm. Both meetings were held at the Guelph Agricultural College.

Mr. Bailey pointed out today that the Central Experimental Farm at Ottawa is at present interested in a new breed of swine from Sweden, a native breed of swine known as Landrace. About five hundred of these are now at the Ottawa farm. Depending upon the Central farm's experiment with this new breed of swine, the Experimental Station here also will investigate the new feasibility of breeding this new breed of swine.

TRIBUTE PAID TO THE LATE C. R. HAWKINS

Annual Service of Prov. Command Took Form of Memorial Service

Byng Memorial

C.R. (Bob) Hawkins was First President of Prov. Command

In a double ceremony of commemoration, Viscount Byng of Vimy and C. Robert Hawkins, of this city, were paid tribute yesterday at Welsford where the annual service of the Provincial Command of the Canadian Legion, B.E.S.L. took place. "Bob" Hawkins was the first president of the Provincial Command in this province.

Rev. R. E. J. Britton, padre of the Canadian Legion preached the memorial services first referring to the late Viscount Byng and paying glowing tribute to him as former governor general of Canada and commander in chief of the Canadian corps in the Great War.

The other "comrade" honored was the late C. Robert Hawkins, who died recently in this city. The memory of Mr. Hawkins, said Mr. Britton, would be that of a valued and worthy member of the provincial command, and his sterling qualities as a man and his zeal and devotion to the Legion and its objects were well known. He had always given valuable service to the Legion and to his province.

Local Legionnaires Attend

About fifty Legion members from this city, in charge of Cecil J. Coveney, local president, were present at the touching ceremonies.

Brigadier General F. W. Hill, C.M.G. D.S.O., of this city, honorary president of the provincial command, and W. C. Lawson, Minto, president, read the scriptures. Following the service General Hill, on behalf of the provincial command and Mr. Lawson, on behalf of the Welsford branch, placed wreaths on the War Memorial at Welsford, and prayers were given by Mr. Britton as the veterans formed a hollow square nearby. Other officials present at yesterday's gathering included G. Earle Logan, past president, who was parade marshal; William J. Ryan, secretary; Commissioner Masie and Major S. H. J. Leach, district supply and transport officer, representing the officer commanding of the military district.

Saint John, Carleton, Minto, Fredericton Junction, McAdam, Fredericton, Moncton, Welsford, Sussex and other points were represented at the gathering.

Compulsory Training!

Compulsory conscription of Canadian youth for periods of two years in the army or navy were urged by Rev. R. E. J. Britton.

Three hundred veterans of the Great War, headed by the regimental brass band of the New Brunswick Dragoons, paraded through the village to the service. The service, which remained for the veterans and which would be following the example of their gallant leader in war, was to encourage and inspire the youth of the land that "they may learn to serve our country as well as you did."

Rev. Mr. Britton called for the large congregation to pray for peace, but not peace at any price. "We must be armed and we must be trained so that the Empire may always hold its head up honorably in case of a crisis," he declared.

The members of the legion must stand behind the youth of Canada and encourage them to patriotism and teach them to have the loyalty and faith in their country which they themselves had displayed. Those who stood for peace at any price were disloyal to the Empire and the truth, liberty and justice for which it stands, he said.

DISTURBANCE, OBSTRUCTION OF OFFICER CHARGED

Three Minto Men defend Charges Here, Result Of Baseball Row

Interest In Cases

Wm. Spencer, Wm. Kiley and Basile Brogan In Court Today

A baseball game between Minto and Marysville on the evening of June 7 had its police court sequel today in the local court when the hearing of several Minto men on charges of being intoxicated, creating a disturbance, resisting arrest and obstructing a police officer in the performance of his duty, was begun.

The incident occurred during the progress of the game and centered about the attempted arrest of William Spencer by Constable Harry Arnold of Marysville. Arnold claimed in police court today that Spencer was in a drunken condition.

According to the constable's story, Kiley had attempted to obstruct him in his attempt to arrest Spencer.

Police Magistrate Walter Limerick found Spencer guilty of resisting arrest and will sentence him this afternoon. Six witnesses were heard in the charge—Constable Harry Arnold, E. Thorpe, Donald Cain, Malcolm Farrell, Guittume Aeyex and William England. Spencer pleaded guilty to being drunk.
