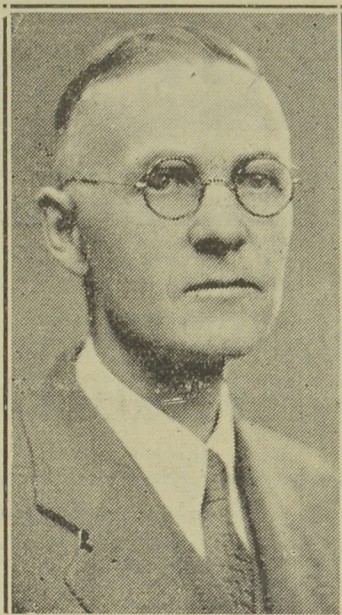
Mr. and Mrs. J. F. MacKay, of McAdam, were guests at the Neal-Carpenter wedding, which recently took place at Hartland.

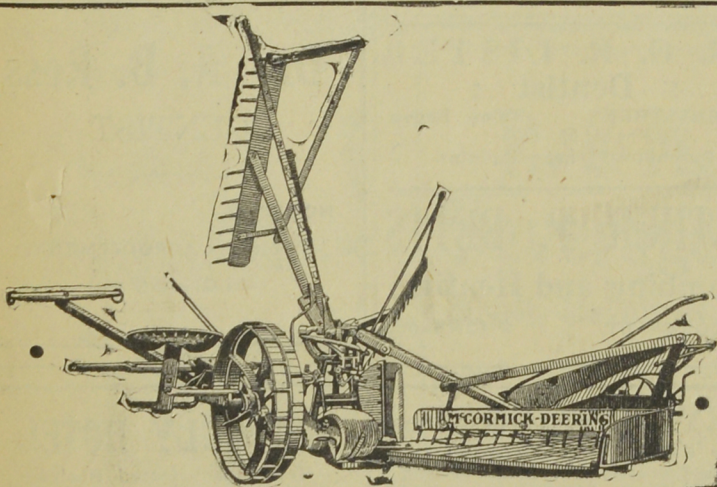
