HOLLAND RAISES FOUR CLASSES OF POTATOES

In Holland, potatoes are divided into four classes; clay potatoes, grown for the greater part in a clay soil; moorland potatoes; sand potatoes; seed potatoes. The clay variety is the most important as regards exports. Belgium, Germany, the United Kingdom and France are the principal markets. Exports of seed potatoes are on the increase. Strange to say, Holland also imports potatoes and the chief country of origin is Malta! Germany supplies seed potatoes. As regards by-products, Holland is a large exporter of potato flour, supplies going to more than forty different countries, including Canada, according to the Agricultural Department of the Canadian National Railways. Dextrine is also widely exported, although Great Britain took about 70 per cent of the total quantity last year: Belgium comes second, followed by Canada, Spain and British India.

Premier Aberhart Seeks Advice From Father Coughlin

TORONTO, Sept. 14—William Aberhart, Alberta's Social Credit premier, announced today he would interview Father Coughlin, the crusading priest in Detroit in connection with his plan to seek expert financial advice before implementing his Social Credit theories in his home province. He said he might also interview Henry Ford.

"I have been following Father Coughlin very closely for some time and I believe he is working along somewhat similar lines to ours," Mr. Aberhart said. An interview has been arranged and I will talk with him in Detroit.

Alberta's apostle-premier stated there was no political significance in his proposed visit to Detroit and possible talk with Mr. Ford. "We do not need Henry Ford's assistance for our scheme, but I should like to have a talk with him because of his interest in economics," he said.

Public Taking Renewed Interest Railway Trains

The days when the public went to go down to the railway station to see the "Limited" flash past would seem to be returning. In the north-western suburbs of Chicago, according to C. J. Hanratty in an article in the September issue of the Canadian National Railways magazine, crowds gather every afternoon and evening at certain grade crossings to see the new fast trains go by! A traffic problem has arisen in this connection because so many come by motor car and park along the roadside, people are also becoming more travel conscious and during the past the number of newspapers in the United States devoting space to travel and resorts has increased. Even cut-and-dried financial journals have broken their serried ranks of market quotations to admit paragraphs about travel jaunts. So much is this the case that the solid Chicago Journal of Commerce and La Salle Street Journal has entered the travel field.
