

MOST TRAVELLED
IRISHMAN WAS
KNOWN HERE

Sir Henry Esmonde Who
Died in Dublin, Visited
This City

Hunted, Fished in N. B.

Had Several Warm Personal
Friends in
This City

Sir Henry Thomas Grattan Esmonde, distinguished Irishman, whose death took place in Dublin on Saturday last was well known in this city in years gone by. Several years ago he visited New Brunswick and left Fredericton on many hunting and fishing trips. He was well known to such old-time guides as Harry Braithwaite. Sir Henry had several warm personal friends in this city who will hear of his death with regret.

Sir Henry Grattan Esmonde was known as the most travelled Irishman of his day, a hunter of big and small game in all parts of the world, the leading Roman Catholic layman in Ireland and a direct descendant of the great Harry Grattan, his mother having been Grattan's great-granddaughter and having inherited the Grattan estates.

He was born in France and educated at Oscot and succeeded to the Irish baronetcy when only a schoolboy. In 1888 he was elected to represent South Dublin in the British House of Commons as a member of the Irish party. He remained Nationalist in his affiliation and continued to sit in Parliament for more than 30 years as a member of that party though he was successively the representative of Kerry and North Wexford. Sir Henry was on several occasions the official representative of the Irish party at the Holy See and he became a Grand Commander of the Holy Sepulchre besides being a Papal Chamberlain to four successive Popes. He served for 30 years as Privy Chamberlain to the Holy See.

With the coming of the new regime in Ireland he became a member of the Free State Senate.

Sir Henry shot his first deer when he was 12 years of age. Since that time he had hunted every animal from the Irish fox to the American wapiti and specially delighted to hunt moose in New Brunswick and to fish New Brunswick rivers. He spoke fluently six different languages and could also converse in many patois and a variety of aboriginal tongues. It is some four or five years since he last visited the Vincent home on Garden street, St. John, but previously he had been almost an annual guest.

LARGER PRIZE
WINNERS AT THE
F'TON EXHIBITION

Livestock Winners Announced
this Morning
by Directors

Show a Success

Attendance Maintains
Record of Past
Three Years

The larger prize winners in livestock at Fredericton's 1935 exhibition which closed on Saturday evening after a successful week, were announced from the exhibition grounds office this morning, along with an optimistic report of this year's fair.

In Ayreshire, McIntyre Brothers of Sussex won in prize money a total of \$195. The farm of M. L. McCarthy also of Sussex captured \$220 in their Holstein entries, which was the largest single award in prize money. This famous New Brunswick farm yearly scores record prize awards not only here but in exhibitions all over Eastern Canada. Vernon K. Harding of Welsford earned \$101.40 prize money.

FREDERICTON WINNERS

His Worship Mayor W. G. Clark won \$41 for his entry of Jerseys, and C. M. Giles, another Fredericton exhibitor, won \$79.80 for his exhibit of Holsteins.

Charles Robison & Sons of Harvey won \$169.80 and Henry Duthie, of Woodstock won \$91.80, both exhibiting Jerseys. The Cossar Farm of Gagetown were high winners for Short-horns although the exact prize money had not been made up today.

C. L. Sypher, secretary of Fredericton Exhibition, Limited, reported today that this year's exhibition was as successful as in past years. Although exact figures have not yet been made up it is expected that the attendance will maintain its average of the past three years. This year's attendance will be slightly in excess of last year's the secretary anticipates.

The weather remained fine during most of the last week, rain holding off entirely save for one evening when a slight rain occurred.

All concessions were moved from the grounds over the week-end. The work of tearing down was completed some time early on Sunday morning. Saturday proved to be the largest closing night attendance for a number of years.

Spud Prices Likely
To Soar in N. B.

Potato prices in this province are expected to soar in view of the week-end advance of prices in the province of Ontario, where there has been a shortage. The New Brunswick crop this year is estimated to be only forty per cent of what it was last season, which will mean an advance in price for the local variety as well.

In Upper Canada spud prices advanced from 70 to 90 cents per bag over the weekend and a further advance is likely to occur. This shortage in Ontario will last until the late crop is marketed.

The "acute" situation in the province of Ontario may have a replica in this province, although no fears are entertained by agricultural officials that it will be a serious one. Digging is not yet general in New Brunswick and no shipments have yet been sent out. There is reason to believe that the bulk of New Brunswick's potato crop this year will be home-consumed because of the smaller crop. This will enhance the price for the farmers.

SUPPS TOMORROW
