

## BLIZZARD AND HEAVY SNOWFALL BLOCKS ROADS

Heavy Drifts As One of Season's Heaviest Storms Occurs

### Roads Blocked

Gales Last Night Did Damage to Telephone, Telegraph Wires

Central New Brunswick was blanketed in eight inches of snow today and all country roads were temporarily blocked as the result of heavy drifting in one of the season's worst snowstorms.

The storm began early last evening and developed into a veritable blizzard late last night. There was heavy drifting on the city streets as the result of the accompanying gales and a report today reveals that most of the country roads in this part of the province were blocked with snow. In some cases there was damage to wires.

Last night's storm was one of the most severe of the season and the snowfall was the heaviest in over a month. Real wintry conditions prevailed everywhere today.

Generally speaking, the present winter has been one of contrasts with last winter. An immense amount of snow fell in 1934 and there was consistent sub-zero temperature. The winter of 1934 was considered to have been the worst in the history of the province. The present winter has witnessed a relatively light amount of snow, and while there have been cold days, the sub-zero temperature has not been consistent. The low mark of 36 degrees below zero has not been reached this year and the mercury has not dropped below the 15 mark yet.

## ST. ANDREW'S CHURCH HELD ITS ANNUAL MEET

Financial Condition of Church Shown To Be Satisfactory
