


Second Days' Races Successful

Large Crowd Present to See New Maritime Record for 2-Year-Olds Accomplished by Sully—Baronet, Martin Dell and Duet Were Winners.

A large crowd witnessed the second day's racing at the Fredericton Race Track. The day was featured by the making of a new record for Maritimes 2-year-olds. The new record was made by Sully, a bay mare owned by Mrs. M. Ballard of North Sydney and driven by the well known down east reinsman, Billy Hood. The time of the new record was 2:21, beating the old record by 1/4 of a second held by Carry On. Sully was bought by Mrs. Ballard at the Old Glory Sales last fall. The first race on the afternoon card was the 2:24 trot which was won by Baronet in three straight heats and driven by the veteran Billy Keys. Duet, owned and driven by R. S. Wright won the Named Race in which there were six starters. Starter Webber ran into some difficulty in the second heat of this class in getting the horses away due to the eagerness of the Fredericton horse Mr. Squires, owned by Harry Jewett. Earl Avery of Woodstock drove another winner today, winning the 2:25 pace event, the last event on the card. The winner of this event was Martin Dell, a bay gelding who was brought into this province by Mr. Alexander of Saint John.

Peter Conroy, the granddad of Maritime "twice arounds," was in the sulky twice today, driving Petoria Axworthy in the 2:24 Trot and in the 2:25 Pace, Clair Napoleon, a P.E.I. owned horse.

MAX BAER IN BEST SHAPE OF HIS CAREER

SPECULATOR, N.Y., Sept. 12—One matter perfectly agreed upon by all members of the Max Baer camp is that for this coming meeting with Joe Louis at the Yankee Stadium on Sept. 24 no effort will be spared in placing the former heavyweight champion into the ring in readiness and condition he has never attained before in his career.

At the present stage of the conditioning grind the results of the careful preparation are already noticeable. To manager Ancil Hoffman, in particular, Baer is progressing in his training at a pace indicative that he will reach the fight at the predescribed stage.

Baer donned the gloves here for the first time on Aug. 24 and, conducting almost daily drills, has now boxed a total of approximately 70 rounds. Beginning slowly, the former heavyweight champion has been witnessed in recent drills accelerating his speed and improving his boxing skill and punching prowess to a degree of perfection.

Few men in the ring have trained as faithfully and as religiously as Max Baer in his current siege. And to those who know Max that circumstance will perhaps have to be seen to be believed.

Hoffman believes now that when the grind is completed Baer will scale about 210 for Louis. At present Baer's weight is around the 215 mark.

Although training with 20-ounce gloves Baer's lethal punches have thus far scored as many as 10 clean knock-out over his sparmates. The majority of his mates wear 12-ounce gloves, but, despite several clean punches to his head, he failed to wreak any apparent damage to the former heavyweight champion.

Already Max Baer's training performances have been witnessed by perhaps 15 times as many people as viewed Max Schmeling's exhibitions during the entire conditioning period. Schmeling trained here three years ago for his bout with Mickey Walker. Last Sunday Baer entertained a crowd of more than 3000.

NEW YORK, Sept. 12—Maxie Baer and Joe Louis, grooming themselves for their heavyweight championship fight Sept. 24 at Yankee Stadium, both took things easy today. Baer spent most of the morning at his Speculator, N.Y., camp posing before motion picture cameras.

Maxie looked better as he gave off a speech in front of the microphones on falling in love than he did during six rounds later in the day with four opponents.

Baer's love talk was prompted by the news that Joe Louis is engaged to Marva Trotter of Chicago, and will be married after he "dusts Baer off."

Maxie took this as his topic for the news-reels and, with the assurance of one who knows, said that "when you're in love you can't keep your mind on a fight. When you're fighting anybody, especially me, you've got to keep your mind off the women and on the work at hand."

As an afterthought, Maxie added: "not that I couldn't stiffen him anyway."

Tony Canella, Willie McGee, Lou Scozza and Seal Harris were Baer's sparmates today.

Louis spent an afternoon of leisure watching Ray Impelletiere, giant heavyweight, prepare for his fight with Ford Smith next Wednesday night.

Joe won't put the gloves on again until Saturday when his collection of sparring partners is expected to be completed. At present only two are on hand, Larry Johnson and Roy Williams.

PITTS, EX-SING SINGER, TRIES FOOTBALL

The new Massachusetts Parole Board today granted permission to Alabama Pitts, ex-convict athlete and member of the Albany International League baseball team, to play football this fall with the Philadelphia Eagles, a professional team.

For exactly a half year Valenti has been trying to make this match and not until he put up the biggest guarantee in years was he able to clinch the match.

McCoy recently won the National Boxing Association lightweight championship from Joe Knight at Montreal and this just about forced Brouillard into the match.
