

# ASK FOR GROUP HOSPITALIZATION IN THE PROVINCE

## Meet Hospital Ass'n

Hon. Dr. W. F. Roberts, Mayor W. G. Clark Other Speakers

A plea for group hospitalization in the province was made today by Dr. S. R. D. Hewett, speaking at the opening session of the seventh annual meeting of the New Brunswick Hospital Association. The sessions will continue this afternoon in the council chamber of the city hall. About thirty were present this morning.

The president, Dr. George Gilbert, K. C., of Bathurst, was in the chair.

His Worship Mayor W. G. Clark delivered the address of welcome this morning at the opening of the meeting, and Hon. Dr. W. F. Roberts, Minister of Health and Labor for New Brunswick, also spoke. G. Harvey, secretary of the Canadian Hospital Council, also gave his address along the lines of social legislation which would be applicable to hospitals.

An address was given also by John A. Sinclair, chairman of the Workmen's Compensation Board, his remarks being directed especially to business with hospitals.

### Round Table Conference

A round table conference was conducted beginning at 11.30 o'clock. This was conducted by R. Corry Clark. One of the subjects discussed was the remuneration of nurses in the province.

The meeting adjourned at noon for luncheon, the association members being invited to be the guests of the Victoria Public Hospital at luncheon at the Nurses' Home. This afternoon at two o'clock the members were taken on a motor drive to points of interest around the city.

Other business transacted this morning included the appointment of the nominating committee, and other committees, consideration of proposed amendments to the constitution and by-laws, reports of officers and committees.

## VICTORIAN ORDER BOARD MET

The September meeting of the Victorian Order Board of Nurses took place yesterday afternoon in the mayor's office of the city hall with a good attendance and J. B. Dickson, the president, in the chair. Miss Pond and Miss Rankin presented their reports which showed a busy month. There had been 82 cases nursed, involving 403 nursing visits; 10 operations attended; 10 maternity cases; nurses assisted at the medical school inspection, vaccination at the pre-school clinic; also in September the nurses assisted in a medical examination of the Normal School students. The Well-Baby Conference had been well attended despite adverse weather. In Fredericton the Catholic Women's League had served tea. W. G. Quinn was chosen to fill the vacancy on the board caused by the death of C. R. Hawkins. Routine business was carried out.

# HUGE CROWD EXPECTED AT FAIR TODAY

Today is Free-for-All Day at Race Track — Monster Attendance at Open Air Attractions Last Evening — Fireworks Display Outstanding.

Today was expected by directors of Fredericton Exhibition, Limited, to be the biggest day of the week. Indications this morning were that the exhibition grounds would swarm with people today in view of the fact that today is Free For All day at the race track. Annually on this day the attendance reaches its peak because of the extra number from New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, P. E. I. and the state of Maine who are here for the races and who also attend the exhibition afterwards.

Judging continued this morning in all departments with judging of Jerseys, shorthorns, sheep and swine featuring today. Boys' and girls' club members were in attendance.

## Fireworks Thrill Crowds

At the races this afternoon a complete show of the open air attractions was given before the packed grandstand. Similar performances were given every evening this week, and will be, each evening until Saturday. The Five Juggling Jewels, one of the finest acts ever to be witnessed on a Fredericton Exhibition open air program fascinated almost three thousand people last night by its expertness and artistic arrangement. The daring feats of the South American aerialist, Valencia atop a 150-foot pole thrilled the crowd to the core by its superb daring. The slide head-first of Valencia was a startling feat of courage.

Meanwhile crowds are flocking into the main building and finding keen interest in the various exhibits. The fireworks display this year is one of the most outstanding that Fredericton Exhibition ever had. The general comment of the display is highly flattering to the directors. The crowds have been particularly impressed with the final few moments of the display, when rocket after rocket is made to explode simultaneously, causing a concentrated noise and color in the heavens—one which almost takes the breath away.

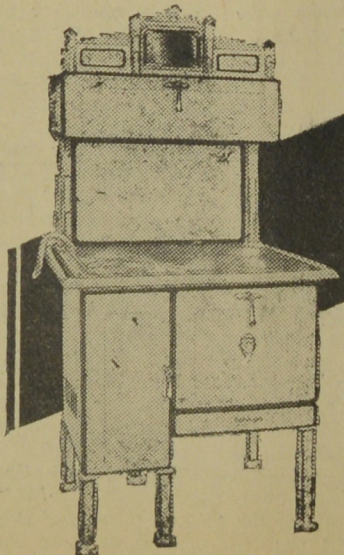

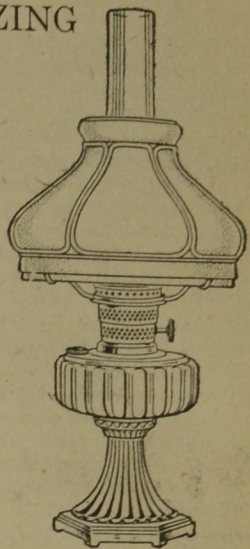
