

## SEVERAL ARE MENTIONED FOR MAYORALTY

R. L. Phillips and Aldermen Mundle and Forbes Proposed  
Are Active Workers

Mayor Clark's Parliamentary Duties Will Exclude Him

With the election of His Worship Mayor W. G. Clark as a member of the House of Commons and his statement after the election that he did not intend to again be considered as a candidate for the mayoralty in January next, the names of several citizens have been mentioned in this connection.

R. L. Phillips, who has previously filled the mayor's chair, is amongst those spoken about for the office. Ald. C. Hedley Forbes and other Fredericton men are also mentioned. Ald. Forbes has been four years at the city council board and has been an active worker in connection with city affairs. He is at the head of several important committees in the council and has given the city good service. Ald. Fred S. Mundle, who has been an alderman for almost a year, states that many of his friends would like him to fill the civic chair and he is seriously considering the matter. Parker H. Currier, president of Fredericton Exhibition, Ltd., who is also a former alderman for King's ward, is mentioned in the same connection.

### Not Considered Yet

Speaking to The Daily Mail this morning Ald. Forbes stated that he has not had time to give the matter any consideration but it would depend upon what developed between now and the end of the year whether he would be a candidate or not. He also stated that several of his friends had expressed a wish to have him offer for mayor.

In the meantime there is no doubt that His Worship Mayor Clark who has given the city good government for almost ten years, and has by his financial ability assisted the council through this trying period, will continue to carry on until his term expires at the close of the present year. After that Mayor Clark's parliamentary duties will probably take him to Ottawa for months at a time.

## N. B. JUNIOR JUDGING TEAMS ARE SELECTED

Stanley Well Represented for Teams and Individual Honors  
66 Competed

Hon. A. C. Taylor Points Out Importance of Junior Club Work

The four teams which will represent this province in the national judging contests at the Royal Winter Fair in Toronto in November were selected at the Dominion Experimental Station judging contests yesterday as follows: Sifroi D. LeBlanc, and Dominique Billiveau, of Memramcook, for dairy cattle judging; Ernest Jarvis and William Tomlinson, of Stanley, for swine judging; Hazel Sellick and Louisa Kerr for Stanley, for poultry judging; and Malcolm Eagles and Fletcher McCully, of Wheaton Mills, for grain judging.

Stanley, Memramcook and Wheaton Mills will have the representatives at the national junior judging contests in Toronto. The Stanley district is sending two of the four teams, and is further honored in view of three of the four won first individual place in their classes, also were from Stanley. The four individual winners were Ernest Jarvis, of Stanley, swine; Louisa Kerr, of Stanley, poultry; Arthur Kerr of Stanley, dairy cattle; and Fletcher McCully, of Wheaton Mills, grain.

### Sixty-six competed

A total of sixty-six boys and girls were present yesterday at the judging contests conducted during the day at the Dominion Experimental Station, all competing. Announcement of the winners was made last evening when the boys and girls as well as officials gathered in the new agricultural school building.

Besides the Toronto trip the first place team winners, the winning dairy cattle judging team was awarded the T. Eaton Company, Ltd., challenge trophy and cash prizes are to be given to the individual winners. The team of LeBlanc and Billiveau were the winners of the T. Eaton trophy.

Speakers at the meeting last evening were Hon. A. C. Taylor, Minister of Agriculture; J. K. King, deputy minister of Agriculture; E. F. Pineau, of Caraquet, Dominion Livestock branch and C. F. Bailey, Superintendent of the Experimental Station.

Hon. Mr. Taylor pointed out that junior club work was one of the most important phases of the department of Agriculture. He said also that the opportunities which such work offered to the individuals and the communities were great and his department was ready to give such work every assistance possible.

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## INDECISION IN MATTER SITE FOR ABATTOIR

Proposal for Site at Exhibition Grounds Causes Dissent  
Objections Ill-Based

Citizens Should be Pleased at Having Plant and Not Elsewhere

The residents of the upper end of the city have for some days been incensed over a proposal that was made at the city council to establish the public abattoir in the rear of the grounds of the Fredericton exhibition. The Daily Mail has had several people call at this office in regard to the matter.

The facts of the matter are that there has been as yet no site selected on which to erect the proposed abattoir and the ground suggested is only one of a number that the promoters of the abattoir have in view. Another proposed site is at the extreme outskirts of the eastern end of the city, away down towards Lincoln. The conditions under which the abattoir is to be erected provide that it is to be within the city limits of the city of Fredericton. But these city limits under the peculiar geographical boundaries of what was once the parish of Fredericton extend away down into the country and there is plenty of room to erect the abattoir within the city limits and at the same time not have it too close to anybody's flower garden.

### Deserves Credit

Peter Neugard, who deserves credit for promoting the scheme in the first place, states that there is a great misconception regarding the noise and odors which come from such a plant.

## MAYOR CLARK IS DECLARED ELECTED TODAY

Declaration Day Proceedings Carried Out At Court House  
113 Rejected Ballots

Member-Elect's Majority Shown to be 249 Votes

Mayor W. G. Clark, Liberal member-elect for York-Sunbury in the recent federal election, was officially declared elected today by Returning Officer Roy W. Smith at the official declaration day procedure in the County Court House today.

The ballot boxes from the 107 polls were opened this morning at 10.00 o'clock and in the presence of Mayor Clark the reports were read and the ballots checked. It was found that the Liberal candidate had a majority of 249 over Hon. R. B. Hanson, slightly larger than the majority announced immediately after the election. Today's reports which are official, gave Mayor Clark 9,291 votes, Mr. Hanson 9,042, and E. O. MacDonald, Reconstruction candidate 1,511.

There were 113 rejected ballots. These had been rejected because of incorrect marking and defacement. The returning officer stated that this was quite a large number of rejected ballots for a Dominion election, seeing that the people only have the one ballot to mark.

### 19,957 Voted

Out of the total of 24,813 eligible voters 19,957 ballots were cast, which is considered a fairly good vote for York-Sunbury. Just previous to the election the number of eligible voters was announced as 24,810, but three names were added from McAdam. (Continued on Page Five)

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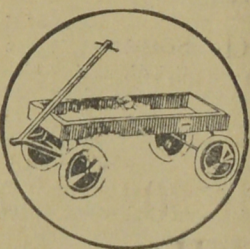
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
