RAILWAYS REPRESENTED

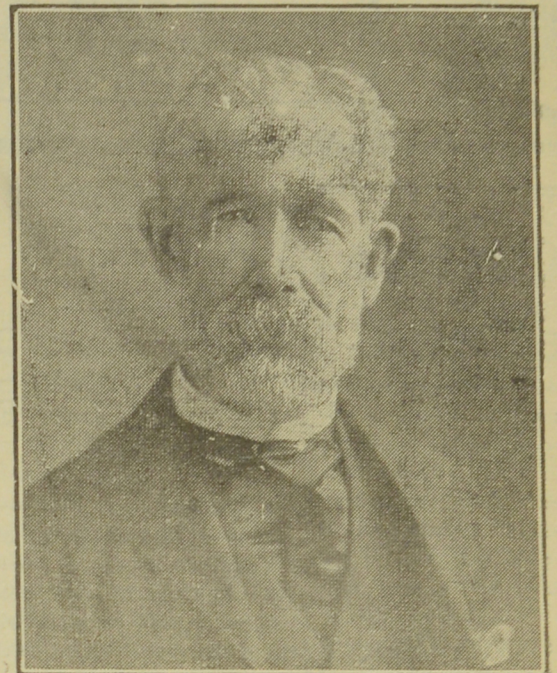

Old Times Recalled



GEORGE P. BARRETT, I. S. O.

Some years ago George Barrett used to be called Fredericton's "Grand Old Man". He was born in this city and died here about fifteen years ago at an advanced age. Mr. Barrett had the history of Fredericton at his finger ends. He could talk by the hour over old times and had many photographs of Fredericton in the early days.

Mr. Barrett was a son of John Barrett contractor and builder who amongst other buildings built the Ketchum residence Elmcroft. As a boy he became an apprentice in the printing business with the late George E. Fenety, former Mayor and King's Printer. After the Royal Gazette office was closed up by the Government, that paper was printed from the Daily Herald office in this city. Mr. Barrett was engaged by the Herald Publishing Company to take charge of the Royal Gazette. He continued in that position

until he retired a few years before his death. He was connected with the Royal Gazette for considerably over sixty years. In recognition of his long and faithful service under different governments. Mr. Barrett in 1908 received from the King the Imperial Service Order.

Mr. Barrett was never married. He was noted for his exceptionally fine character and integrity. He was a real gentleman of the good old school. He made two trips to Boston in his earlier days. Outside of these trips he was never away from Fredericton. He never saw Gagetown nor any other place within fifty miles of Fredericton although he spent all his life in this city.

He was a life long member of the Wilmot, formerly the Methodist Church and there was probably not a Sunday in fifty years that did not find Mr. Barrett present at all services in the church. At his death the funeral service in the church was one of the most largely attended ever seen in that building. Mrs. B. C. Foster is a niece of the late Mr. Barrett and the late C. E. Neill formerly General Manager of the Royal Bank of Canada was a nephew.

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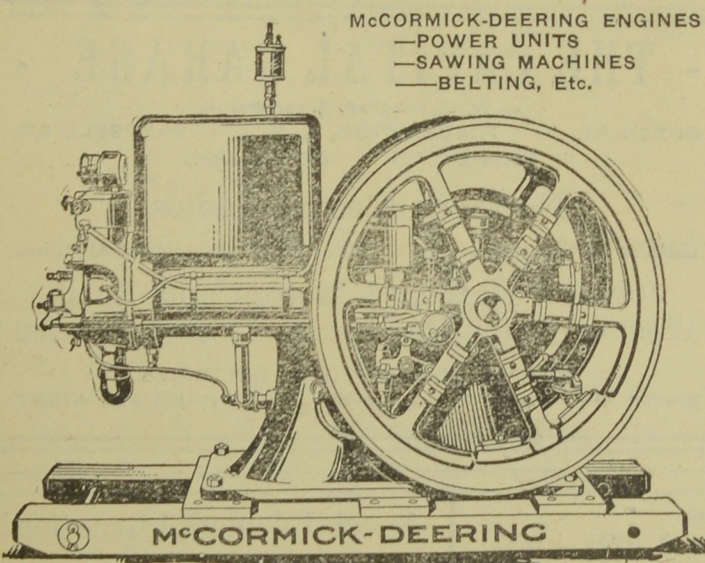
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
