Rev. Dr. Wightman Was

The Rev. N. D. Oliver, B.A., was officially inducted into the pastoral charge of the United Church at Marysville last evening. Notwithstanding the very warm weather, the congregation was well represented, the church being well filled with members, adherents and friends.

Rev. Dr. F. A. Wightman, under the direction of the Fredericton Presbytery, had charge of the service and officiated at the service of induction, which was most impressive. Rev. W. A. Burge, of South Devon, gave the charge to the newly inducted minister and Rev. J. S. Gregg to the congregation. Both addresses were most appropriate for the occasion. The music was in keeping with the occasion and was in charge of the organist, Mrs. Smith, a full choir being in attendance. An interesting feature of the induction was the extending of the right hand of fellowship to Mr. and Mrs. Oliver by the members of the Presbytery and the elders of the church. The service was brought to a close with the benediction, pronounced by the new minister, after which he and Mrs. Oliver were introduced to the congregation at the door by Mr. McInnis and other elders as they dispersed.

Rev. Mr. Oliver has for several years been stationed at Waweg, near St. Stephen, where he had a fruitful ministry. He is a young man well qualified educationally for his high calling and also possesses a pleasing personality. The whole community will join in welcoming Mr. and Mrs. Oliver to their new surroundings. He succeeds Rev. M. H. Manuel, recently removed to Nova Scotia.

TILLEY CABINET  
ENDS REGIME  
IN TEN DAYS

Final Meeting of Old  
Cabinet Here on Wed-  
nesday Next

Political Developments

Premier Tilley Had No  
Announcements To  
Make Last Night

The Tilley government which was defeated on June will hand over the seals of office to the Lieutenant-Governor within ten days from now. The final meeting of the present administration will be held on Wednesday next by which time it is understood that the different members of the executive will have cleaned out their desks and made ready to vacate their respective offices. It is understood that by Thursday next Premier Tilley will place the resignation of himself and cabinet in the hands of His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor and that he will suggest to the governor that he call upon the Hon. Allison A. Dysart to form a cabinet. It is probable that Hon. Mr. Dysart who has the full say as to who are to be the members of the new executive may be able at that time to accept the responsibility of forming a cabinet and will be able to submit the names of its members to the government.

Hon. Mr. Dysart who has been on a fishing trip to the Restigouche during the early part of the week passed through Bathurst yesterday on his return to him home at Buctouche. While at Bathurst Mr. Dysart met F. W. Pirie of Victoria who is spoken of as the Minister of Agriculture in the new cabinet, and also C. T. Richard, barrister at Bathurst, who was lately re-elected member for Gloucester and who will probably be in the new cabinet as provincial secretary-treasurer. The three stalwarts of the incoming government had a jolly talk over the results of the elections and no doubt discussed the matter of cabinet possibilities although of course, it is left in the hands of the premier to select his own cabinet.

New Cabinet Rumors  
While no announcement of course has yet been made as to who the personnel of the new cabinet may be it is understood that it will contain the following: Hon. A. A. Dysart, premier and president of the executive council; J. B. McNair, attorney general; Clovis T. Richard, provincial secretary-treasurer; W. S. Anderson, minister of public works; Dr. W. E. Robertson, Minister of Health. Whether Hon. Mr. Dysart, who was a former minister of lands and mines, will accept a similar portfolio in his own government now or whether he will turn that over to someone else has probably not yet been decided. The chairman of the Hydro Electric Commission, formerly held by Hon. Albert E. Reilly may go to Mayor Blakney, of Moncton, while A. C. Patterson of Saint John is spoken of as the new minister of Federal Affairs to be created by the Dysart Government.

Premier Tilley and his cabinet are continuing their meeting here today. All members of the Cabinet were pre-

LOSES ONE OF ITS  
OLDEST CITIZENS

John Simeon Armstrong  
Retired Civil Engineer,  
Died Last Night

A Popular Figure

Had Been Engaged In  
Many Important  
Projects

After an illness extending over four months, John Simeon Armstrong, one of Fredericton's oldest citizens and retired civil engineer of note, passed away last evening at 768 Brunswick street. Mr. Armstrong was born in Saint John in 1847 and was a son of the late Rev. Canon George Mortimer Armstrong who for twenty-five years was rector of St. John's church at Saint John. Deceased was educated at King's College, Windsor, N. S., and followed the profession of a civil engineer, having been engaged at various times in important projects. His wife, who was Miss Lydia Jane, daughter of the late Capt. John Gregory, passed away six years ago. No direct descendants of the family survive.

Mr. Armstrong was a faithful member of Christchurch Cathedral which he represented for many years on the Synod.

The funeral will be held on Saturday afternoon. A private service of prayer will be held at the home of Mrs. Robinson, 768 Brunswick street.

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
