MADAWASKA WANTS MORE LAND FOR SETTLEMENT

County Councillors Will Press Matter Upon the Government

Edmundston, N. B., Jan. 9.—The annual session of the Madawaska Municipal Council opened here this morning with all councillors present and Warden Wilfrid Verret of St. Francis presiding. In the afternoon some discussion took place on the needs of more land for settlement and it was resolved to continue pressure upon the provincial government for lands suitable for colonization between St. Leonard and St. Quentin, at present owned by the New Brunswick Railway Company.

The sum of \$1,200 was voted to the board of health for the year.

The cost of the care of indigents at the Municipal home amounted to \$1,400 for the last year. There were 20 residing in the home.

The cost of administration of justice in the county, although there were no cases of any importance during the last year was discussed. It was suggested that a committee confer with the attorney-general on ways and means for a reduction.

The council favored obligatory insurance for automobiles. 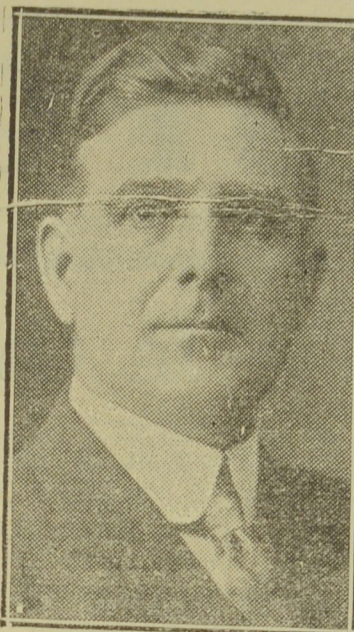

Diocesan Board of W. A. Makes Plans at Monthly Meeting

The annual meeting of the Fredericton diocesan board of the W. A. will be held in Trinity Church hall, Saint John, on April 2, 3, and 4, and throughout the diocese the first Sunday in February will be observed as W. A. Sunday for furtherance of the W. A. Jubilee membership campaign. These announcements were made at the monthly meeting yesterday in the schoolroom of the Mission Church, St. John Baptist, by the president, Mrs. G. C. P. McIntyre, who was in the chair.

The campaign was launched in this diocese yesterday morning when W. A. members attended a celebration of Holy Communion in Trinity Church when Rev. W. A. Flier, Rev. W. C. V. Martin and Rev. F. J. Keble were celebrants. Following the celebration there was continual intercession offered in Trinity Church until 2.30 p.m. when members adjourned to the Mission church where Rev. Canon J. V. Young conducted devotions and gave an address based on the text "Thy Kingdom Come."

The special speaker in the general session was Dr. Catherine Travis, of Hampton, missionary on furlough from China. There is no fighting in China at the present time except in the driving out of the communists, Dr. Travis stated.

The treasurer reported there had been an increase in membership and an increase in contributors to the general pledge fund for 1934.

Soldiers-Then and Now

(By Theodore Goodridge Roberts) This series of Articles by a well-known Fredericton Writer will appear each day until further notice.

Where and what is Major "Fog-horn" MacDonald these days? I mentioned him in one of these pieces not long ago; and I was talking yesterday to a lad who entertains high opinions of that unconventional happy warrior, that early tunnelling expert of ours who pushed so deep and far one day in his subterranean efforts that, though he had gone down in Flanders, he came up in Windsor Great Park.

"Fog-horn's heart was as big as his voice," said this one of his many admirers.

Fog-horn was a big man in whatever place he belonged before the war of 1914-18; and a child of nature. In his composite character of big man and child of nature he took no more stock in the significance of military ranks and trappings than a porcupine or bull moose might have taken. He was above such vanities. He was a private soldier on Salisbury Plain; and even now one pities those corporals and sergeants and that junior officer whom the accidents of war had placed in immediate authority over him. He went to London some time about Christmas of that year (1914) and, in company with another hero of the Plain chucked money around in the true spirit of the old frontier. One day (so the story goes—but I don't vouch for it) he and his particular friend sat in the bar of the Savoy and contemplated their few remaining £1 Treasury Notes. There were not enough of those "Bunberries" to last out the remaining days of their leave, by their lavish frontier standards.

"There's the Minister," said Fog-horn's comrade; and sure enough, there was Canada's own Sir Sam in company with a number of military and political personages of high though lesser importance. Our hero's (Fog-horn's) eyes brightened at that sight.

"Leave it to me," said he. He placed himself at the Minister's elbow.

"Howdy Sam, Old Timer! How's tricks?"

"Hah! It's you, Fig-horn! How'd yedo."

"Busted, Need a fiver — English money."

"Call it ten," said the Minister, with an appropriate gesture; and thus it was that Fog-horn and his comrade

were able to stay out their time in London.

While tunnelling in France, Fog-horn was made a Lieutenant. He did not acknowledge the promotion by any change of attire. That he was boss of his gang and a job was enough for him and the gang, but his neglect of military trappings led to confusion in his contacts with surrounding authorities and forces. After a month or so of carrying-on like a Commanding Officer without the display of any tag or badge of authoritative rank, he weakened so far as to stick two or three bronze "pips" somewhere about his person. After tunnelling and mining and blowing to the surface here and there to his heart's content, (and it has been said that his activities not only upset the enemy but sometimes astonished his friends), he appears to reform. Enough of cold earth and hot explosions! His soul craved peace and rural surroundings. So he went to England and joined the Canadian Forestry Corps with the rank of major. And he dressed the part, I was told. Now his field of duty lay in Windsor Great Park and he served King and Country in bosky places. And when I last heard of him, which was in 1918, he had invited Their (Gongsuffering) Majesties to a real Canadian lumber-camp breakfast of pork-and beans and riz biscuits.

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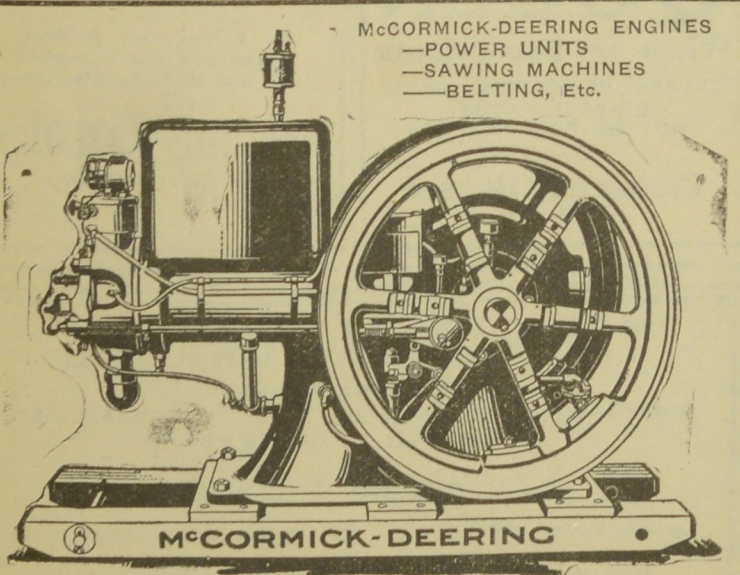
