

Yesterday Afternoon Blaze Was Quite A Spectacle

A fire which originated in a smokehouse at the rear of W. C. Lee's meat market late yesterday afternoon completely destroyed the smoke-house and also did considerable damage to an ice house owned by the Farmers' Dairy Co-operative Co. Ltd. on King Minister of Trade and Commerce. street. The damage was estimated as approximately \$3,500.

the two hours it lasted, and huge clouds of smoke issued from the buildings while the fire was in progress.. Firemen succeeded in checking the blaze after nearly two hours' fighting, but the smokehouse was completely destroyed. Only a portion of the top layer of ice blocks were melted by the intense heat, and workmen spread sawdust and hay over the remainder of the ice last evening, preserving it for the season. The ice house was about half full.


The Farmers' Dairy Co-operative Co. Ltd., building is a metal structure sheathed inside, covered with a tar paper roof. It is situated at the rear of the Dairy on King street The smokehouse was attached to the ice house, this accounting for the spread of the fire. An ell on the back of the house owned by Ashley A. Colter, formerly the Pickard boarding house, was slightly burned.

The fire spread so rapidly at first that it seemed as if all the residences in that vicinity would be threatened. The mounting smoke added to the general appearance of hazard. 
**Spans Gaspereau River**

Walker well known Liberals have been men- of Millville, York county, and is a model of durable and first class workmanship. It was designed by C. A. MacVey and R. A. Malloy of the Public Works engineering staff and constructed under their supervision. Built of reinforced concrete of a light shade it is a very handsome and attractive structure and the residents of Port Elgin are justly proud of it

The bridge spans the Gaspereau River, a tidal water which flows. through the village, and is of the arch culvert design. The single span is sixty feet in length and rests on two concrete piers with a solid granite facing. A sidewalk extends for some distance beyond the structure at either end. The piers are set on bedrock and were built with the aid of coffer


