Wood, photographer and publicity representative, are among the latest sportsmen to arrive in the province for fishing and hunting. They are at present on the Mouth of Cain's river with Guides Allen and Wade, and will fish salmon until the close of the angling season, October 15. After that they will hunt big game, remaining here for about three weeks. Already the party have captured some salmon and grise and shot a few partridge. Yesterday on the Cain's they "routed" a bear. Rt. Rev. P. A. Bray On Confirmation Tour

Right Rev. P. A. Bray, Catholic Bishop of the Diocese of Saint John will arrive here on Friday evening for a Confirmation tour. On Saturday he will confirm a large number of candidates at St. Dunstan's church. He will hold confirmation at St. Anthony's church in Devon on Sunday morning and at the Stanley church on Sunday afternoon. Bishop Bray will hold a reception here on Sunday evening. This is the first visit of Bishop Bray to Fredericton since his appointment to succeed the late Rev. E. A. LeBlanc who died about a year ago. Those who have had the pleasure of meeting Bishop Bray speak very highly of his ability and also of his genial kindly manner. During the past couple of weeks Bishop Bray has been conducting confirmation services in the different parts of the province.

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HEAVY SQUALL ON HOLIDAY DID DAMAGE IN N.B.

Telephone Circuits Out By Force of the Windstorm  
Wind Played Tricks  
Crops, Damaged Somewhat, Fruit Blown From Trees

A gigantic northwest squall which hit the capital city with sudden intensity yesterday afternoon and lasted almost interruptedly through the night, upset electric and telephone service in this part of the province and in some places caused falling tree branches to block the highways.

The worst damage, probably, was absorbed by the New Brunswick Telephone Company, for many of its circuits were damaged two of them linking Saint John with the central part of the province. Many toll lines were affected. Most of the damage was centered in the Stanley and Doaktown vicinity where all circuits were out. There was also trouble at Prince William and as far north as Edmundston. A circuit was out at Gagetown also. Limbs of trees felled by the roaring gales cause the damage by hurling themselves over wires all along the highways.

Heavy branches of trees fell at along the highways and in some places automobilists out for the Thanksgiving day holiday were temporarily held up while they were forced to remove big branches from the highway. No casualties are reported.

The Maritime Electric Co., Ltd. reports that tree branches fell across wires, interrupting service in this vicinity. One branch fell across wires in the vicinity of Lady Ashburnham's residence on Brunswick street.

On the Fredericton-Devon highway bridge on the Devon side, where employees are at work painting at the present time, the wind performed a peculiar rite on the plank scaffolding. The planks were lifted and blown up on the wires on the bridge, which damaged the service.

J. J. Malloy, veteran engineer at the pumping station, stated today that the gales of yesterday were not exceptional gales, claiming that these occur in September and March only.

The squall yesterday did some damage to crops, and a quantity of unpicked fruit was blown from the trees by the heavy wind. Officials at the Experimental Station here report, however, that this damage was not extensive.

**IN SLIGHT ACCIDENT**  
A. W. Barbour, deputy minister of public works, experienced cuts about his face when the car in which he was driving just outside Campbellton on Saturday evening, came into collision with a truck. 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DEFICIT SHOWN FOR U.N.B. YEAR SENATE HEARS

Senate at Annual Meet Today Consider Finances  
Report of President  
Certain of Senate Think Deficits Should Cease

The University of New Brunswick Senate at its annual meeting held here this morning heard the financial report presented by the registrar. Some of the members of the Senate who were present expressed considerable dissatisfaction over the fact that the university had again to report a deficit on the past year's operations. A lengthy discussion took place in connection with the financial statement. Speaking of the matter of the deficit, one of the members of the Senate today stated that he thought the time had come when the university, with all the handouts in the way of grants and also the fairly respectable tuition fee and the large number of students who were present this year, should be able to show a balance on the right side of the ledger.

It has long been felt by certain members of the government and others that the university should be placed on a more substantial basis and that more business management should be exhibited in the administration of its affairs, also that the University be made to give a more extended service. It is felt that the time has come when the university cannot stand upon a pedestal and ignore certain business methods which have long since been adopted by up-to-date educational institutions.

The University of New Brunswick Senate at its annual meeting held here today, noted a deficit on the past year's operations and this morning conferred lengthily on the financial position of the university. Dr. C. C. Jones, president of the University, occupied the chair at today's meeting. (Continued on Page Four)

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**Supt. Bruce, New R. C. M. P. Head, On Inspection**

Superintendent W. V. M. B. Bruce, new head of "J" Division, New Brunswick, of the R.C.M.P., who has been transferred from "D" Division Lethbridge, Alta., to this city, arrived here with Mrs. Bruce and family on Sunday, and he will take over his new duties tomorrow. Major E. C. P. Salt, whom he succeeds here, is expected to leave here tomorrow or Thursday for Lethbridge to take over his new duties. Meantime Major Salt and family are stopping at the Queen Hotel.

Superintendent Bruce was accompanied by Mrs. Bruce and their daughter, Miss Enid, and sons, Gordon and Kenneth. Major Salt and Superintendent T. V. Sandys-Wunsch, of the auditing department at Ottawa, met the party at Fredericton Junction driving them to this city.

Mrs. Salt and her family left for Lethbridge on Sunday and will be joined there by Major Salt later this week. Yesterday Superintendent Bruce visited Saint John on his initial inspection tour of the various divisions and detachments. He is visiting Moncton today and later Campbellton. It is Superintendent Bruce's first visit to New Brunswick. He joined the force in 1907 in Regina and in the same year was transferred to Calgary. From there he was sent into the Arctic, where he participated in the famous hunt for the Eskimo murderers of Fathers Rouvier and Leroux, Catholic missionaries. In 1917 he returned to Calgary and in the following year he went to Siberia with the Mounted Police squadron. On his return to Canada, he was stationed at Brandon where he received his commission, and in 1921 went to Lethbridge. The following year he was sent to East Kootenay, being stationed at Fernie, B.C. and from 1925 to 1932 he served in the Yukon. He "came out" in 1932, going to Banff, and in 1934 was transferred to Lethbridge, succeeding Inspector Kenneth Duncan. He was promoted to the rank of superintendent last year.
