MONSTER EXCURSION

MONTHLY MEETING
The monthly meeting of the Fredericton sub-district board of health was held last night in the board office on Queen Street with Dr. J. M. Cameron, district medical health officer, presiding. The report for the month of January showed that the epidemic of measles in the city had been cleared up and that there were only two cases of notifiable diseases, both of them scarlet fever. Vital statistics for the month were given as follows: births, 52; deaths, 7; and marriages, 4. All members were present except Mrs. Edna Farrell, the secretary.

EGG LAYING CONTEST
The 13th week of the 16th New Brunswick Eggs Laying contest conducted at the Dominion Experimental Station was concluded on Thursday, January 30th, with a production of 658 eggs and 673.6 points. This is an average production for the week of 39.1 per cent. The Barred Rocks owned by Walter Dougan, Hampstead, led in production for the week with 45 eggs and 50.4 points. The Barred Rocks owned by Arthur Graham, Hoyt Station, were in second position for the week with 47 eggs and 47.9 points. The Barred Rocks owned by Karl W. Smith, Prince William, were in third position for the week with 46 eggs and 47.6 points.

NEW COUNCIL IS MEETING ON MONDAY NIGHT

Will Arrange for By-Election to Fill St. Anne's Ward Vacancy

Mayor G. Willard Kitchen Will Preside at February Meeting

Fredericton's new City Council, minus one member who hasn't yet been chosen for the ensuing year, will hold its first meeting of the new year on Monday evening with His Worship Mayor G. Willard Kitchen presiding. One of the chief matters of interest to come before the council this month is the matter of a by-election in St. Anne's ward to fill the vacancy caused by Mayor Kitchen's graduation from that position. Plans will be made for Nomination Day, which will likely come some day next week.

The only names so far suggested as possible candidates for the vacant ward are E. C. Atkinson and P. M. Levine.

It is expected that a delegation of the local Board of Trade will appear before the council in connection with a grant from the council for the ensuing year, and other details of the work of that body.

WILL CONSIDER STOCKING STREAM IN MADAWASKA

The stocking of streams with salmon and trout improvement were discussed at a meeting of the Madawaska branch of the Fish and Game Protective Association Thursday night in Edmundston, it was announced today by L. H. Parks, supervisor of fisheries who returned here last night from that place. Those present at the meeting were A. J. Cyr, president; A. G. Goucher, 1st vice president; A. R. Desjardins, 2nd vice-president; Leon Gagnon, treasurer; Martin Theriault, Rene Cyr, and C. J. Leger, treasurer. Next week Mr. Parks expects to go to Halifax, where he will attend a meeting of all the supervisors in the Maritime Provinces.

Mail for Members, Daily Papers To Be Dispensed

According to the clerk of the Legislature the new compartment installed at the Parliament Buildings is to be used only for the handling of mail matter, belonging to the members. Instead of the arrangement which has been going on for years and which has not been satisfactory. The members will now mail their letters in the corridor and will also receive all their mail matter at the same place. The lady who will preside over the post-office compartment will also handle the daily papers.

The handling of the newspapers at the post office compartment will do away with the number of newboys congregating about the corridor and will be much more convenient in every way. It is not the intention to have a "concession" for the sale of cigars or any other article as has been intimated by some of the papers. This latter arrangement would detract from the dignity of the legislative building.

LARGE NUMBER EXPECTED FOR CONFERENCE

Colonization Conference for Thursday Arranged by Hon. Mr. Pirie

Improved Colonization

Favorable Comment of Plan Since Publication by The Daily Mail

The conference on colonization matters which was outlined in The Daily Mail yesterday will be held on Thursday next as stated by this paper yesterday and it is understood that a large number of members from the counties mentioned as interested will be present.

It is understood that it is the intention to take up the matter of an improved scheme of colonization which Hon. Mr. Pirie contends has been carried on in a very ragged way in the past. An effort will be made to arrive at some scheme of systematic colonization endeavor. The aim is to establish some effective policy which would be of a permanent and beneficial nature both to the province and to those who wish to take up new farms.

The counties interested, as stated yesterday in The Mail, are Madawaska, Restigouche, Gloucester, Northumberland, Kent, Victoria, and also York and Sanbury to a smaller extent.

There is much favorable comment on the suggestion made yesterday to The Daily Mail by Hon. F. W. Pirie, Minister of Lands and Mines, that no new settlements be opened up along the area of the new road which is being constructed from Plaster Rock to the Miramichi. This road runs through some of the best lumber areas of the province and it would be unfortunate if settlers were allowed to go in there and start forest fires, thus destroying millions of feet of valuable lumber, as has been the case in the northern sections of the province during recent years. It is felt that New Brunswick offers plenty of opportunities for colonization settlement without jeopardizing our forest wealth. The Daily Mail's exclusive story yesterday brought forth a considerable amount of favorable comment.

Although tariffs have been reduced on goods coming into this country, nevertheless this report of Canadian National Revenue returns for this port for the month of January shows an increase of \$8,946.51. This is shown in the report of F. P. Colter, collector of National revenue given out today.

This is an indication that the volume of business accruing under the new lower tariff has been great enough to cancel the fact of smaller collection on the individual article. It is also a prosperous sign of better times.

The total customs import duty for January, 1936 is \$16,161.44. It is shown in the report of revenue collections.
