However, on this occasion, Rupert Hughes, as master of ceremonies will introduce another talented singer, Miss Thelma Leeds, beautiful brunette graduate of grand opera, noted as the possessor of a dual voice.

OLD WINE IN NEW BOTTLES

REVELSTOKE, B. C.—An entirely new interest has suddenly been taken in Revelstoke real estate, particularly the Rat Trap Saloon set of the 'Moodyville' location here, for the railway construction epic, 'The Great Barrier,' now in production by Gaumont British.

In making an excavation, workmen came across no less than eight bottles of rare old brandy five feet below the surface of the ground. Many 'claims' were staked on the spot and all visible supply of the liquor had vanished before members of 'The Great Barrier' unit arrived on the scene although one bottle was presented to Mayor A. Pradalino of Revelstoke.

Investigation brought out the information that the site had been occupied by the Union Hotel, a landmark and popular centre of pioneer railway development days here, the hostelry having been burned to the ground 356 years ago. The proprietor was said to be Hugh Brown who later moved to Sicamous, B. C. Much debris was unearthed by the workmen and apparently the bottles had been stored in the hotel cellar.

Thus, history has been practically repeated in the erection of the "Rat Trap Saloon," recorded in the Alan Sullivan novel on the building of the first transcontinental railroad which is the basis for 'The Great Barrier,' featuring Richard Arlen.

Radio Notes

Starting August 31 and running for a period of nearly two weeks, one of the most historic celebrations ever to be held in America will be broadcast almost in its entirety over the short-wave Station WIXAL in Boston.

The occasion will be the Harvard University Tercentenary Celebration, and will illustrate the great progress in learning and education during the past 300 years since the founding of the university. Leading professors from many of the American universities outside of Harvard as well as prominent educators from Cambridge and Oxford in England, from Leipzig, from Rome, and practically every important university on the Continent of Europe will be on hand.

Mrs. Elmer Harris, wife of the noted screen writer, and son, of Hollywood, California, passed through Moncton en route to Prince Edward Island, where they will spend several weeks at their summer cottage. Mrs. Harris said that her husband may join them later. Elmer Harris does a considerable amount of his writing for the screen on the Island.
