FINED UNDER INDIAN ACT

GOVERNMENT MEET ENDS

The meeting of the provincial cabinet which was held here this week, concluded yesterday afternoon. A brief meeting of the Board of Education was held at which the matter of the revision of boundaries of several school districts and routine business was dealt with. The government is not expected to meet next week.

BODY FOUND

A report was received today by officials of the R.C.M.P. that the body of Robert Williamson, of Toronto, was discovered, located in a salmon net near the Manguerville shore. The police sent two men, Inspector Gray and Constable Ryder, to investigate the report. Up until late this afternoon there was no further information. The police confirmed the report that a body was found at Manguerville today but it was not definitely known whether it was Williamson's body. Alex Evans of Cross Creek discovered the body.

TOURIST TRAVEL INCREASES

Tourist travel through this city is gradually increasing, it was stated today by Alex Murray, secretary of the Board of Trade who is in charge of the new tourist bureau at the west end of the city. Cars are coming from all directions. The first question they ask is direction, then where to eat. Some shop, some look for a hotel, for a place to pitch a tent, or for an overnight cabin. It is believed that the board's bureau is causing the tourists to linger in this section longer than in other years and giving them a chance to visit the scenic points and various stores.

SHARP CHECK ON HIGHWAYS BY DEPARTMENT

Special Constable Here Checking on Weight of Trucks

Works in This Locality

Special Scales to Check on Trucks Which Are Overweight

The provincial department of public works in its policy of keeping a sharp check on motor vehicles operating on the provincial highways, have a special constable at work in this vicinity this week checking up on the weight of automobiles. He is E. R. Sowers, of Saint John, who began his duties on Wednesday, and who is at the present time working in this vicinity.

Mr. Sowers is in khaki uniform, and during the past couple of days has conducted a special examination of trucks with respect to whether the weight and other specifications are within the motor vehicle regulations.

The new constable is working with a special scales and those trucks which are over weight, are being charged on the extra weight according to how much overweight they are. Several trucks in this vicinity have already been checked up in this matter by the special constable. Mr. Sowers is working in conjunction with H. C. Currie, motor vehicle and gasoline inspector here.

The special weighing outfit which Mr. Sowers uses is of the portable type.

H. M. KING OF HOBOES VISITS CITY AGAIN

"My Full Name Is . . . Well, It's Too Much For Us

Likes Fredericton

Confesses He Owes the Railroads Sum of \$8,516.25

"My full name is Joseph Leon ben-Morris Lazar Cohen Siegal Lazarowitz," said His Majesty King of the Hoboes in an interview with a reporter of The Daily Mail today. He is the guest of Mr. and Mrs. Lewis Budovitch, King street, of this city, and arrived in town today and will spend the weekend. He starts Monday for Saint John, Moncton and points east.

"I like Fredericton, he said, "because when I was here three and a half years ago, one of the citizens afforded me the pleasure of seeing your beautiful town with a free trip around the city." Speaking of free trips His Majesty has hiked on the highways, ridden the rails, stowed in an aeroplane, and on several steamships, and he estimates he owes the railroad \$8,516.25 to date.

He has been in every state in the Union and eight provinces of Canada. Prince Edward Island is the only one he has missed and he intends to round off by visiting there. He has seen five Mexican states, Cuba, and the republic of Panama.

Lazarowitz is thirty years old, an orthodox Hebrew, speaking English very well and converses freely in Hebrew. He has a high school education, is a United States citizen. He has been a professional hobo for seventeen years and his residence is—anywhere. With all his travelling and sightseeing, it has cost him 25 cents per day on an average, and some day he says he hopes to settle down and retire when he finally learns that two can live as cheaply as one.

At the Hoboes' Convention held in Louisville, Ky., last May he presented his credentials to the meeting and was elected King.

"There is as you know the Hoboes' Union of North America, which has annual meetings," and he went on to tell of the various departments of the Union. The minister of railways highways and canals; there is a minister for good towns and hostile towns, and the organization is humanitarian enough to provide for sick or disabled hoboes.

He carries a 58-pound hobo pack with a complete file of newspaper, clippings, letters from President Roosevelt, Prime Minister Mackenzie King, and also keeps a daily record of statistical data, which he claims "is the shortest life record
