We called for an appointment. "Yes, yes, old man," replied the voice at the other end of the wire. Dash over here. Quick now!"

Breathlessly, we grabbed a cab and ordered the driver to speed to the speediest man in the world—a man who piloted his streamlined Bluebird at the amazing record of 301.33 miles per hour over the Utah Salt Flats. We were at Campbell's door in a jiffy.

But Campbell, fearless speed king of them all, wasn't there. Instead, we were met by a quiet, handsome Scot, who acted bewildered as he offered apologies.

"I say, old chap," he said, "what is this all about? For hours I have been besieged and beleaguered by phone calls from reporters and picture men. I do my best to tell them I'm just a plain man who came over for the trip."

"My name is Malcolm Campbell. I am a fruit and vegetable merchant in Glasgow. I drive an automobile—just a plain old machine—but never over forty miles an hour. Never have I been arrested for breaking traffic laws. Except for being a grandson of the original Sir Malcolm Campbell and shooting in the 70's occasionally, I have never done anything to gain fame."

As we started to leave he and a Scottish friend named "Tommy" stopped us.

"It's a disgrace," said Tommy. "What's a disgrace?" we asked. "Why, when we arrived in New York we saw a tug. On it was a big sign, which read: 'Welcome to the Queen Mary, England's greatest ship! Why, the pretty thing was built in Scotland.'"

As we finally left we heard a song floating from the Campbell suite.
