### HOME FROM LOUISIANA

Donald Marsh, of Nashwaaksis, who has been taking a post-graduate course at the Louisiana State College, returned to this city yesterday. **HURT WHEN TRUCK OVERTURNS**

Friends will be pleased to learn of the continued improvement in the condition of Roderick Bidlake, Fredericton man, who was injured quite severely in an accident which occurred at the site of the C.N.R. bridge salvaging operations some days ago. Mr. Bidlake has been confined in the Victoria Hospital with a slight concussion of the brain. His condition, however, is gradually showing improvement.

Leonard Fletcher, 19, son of George L. Fletcher of Coles Island, Queens county, had the misfortune to break his foot in an auto accident several days ago, and is now confined in the hospital at Sussex. ### AN EXPLANATION

C. B. Croasdale, chief highway engineer of the province, explained why trucks go on the wrong side of the road here last night. It seems that it is necessary for them to do so every other trip in order to float the gravel from one side of the highway to the other. This is necessary for highway maintenance, he said. The machines are painted red, they carry red flags at both ends of their blades and their rate of speed is only between three and four miles per hour. At present there are 125 of these machines in the province. They have always worked this way and Mr. Croasdale says that in the past six years only two accidents have occurred.

## RAILWAY MEN APPEAR BEFORE GOV'T TODAY

Here in Connection With Bus and Truck Competition—Government Scheduled to Meet This Afternoon—Premier Back From Trip.

A delegation representing the railway employees of both the C.N.R. and C.P.R. are slated to appear before the provincial cabinet at its meeting, which commences at 2.30 o'clock this afternoon. Premier A. A. Dymally and his cabinet have already arrived in the city for the meeting of the government. The delegation are meeting the government regarding the bus and truck competition and it is expected that they will ask the government to take some action respecting the growth of the bus situation in the province, which threatens their livelihood. A large number of applications for bus franchises are scheduled to be heard by the N. B. Board of Public Utilities, which meets on Thursday of this week at Saint John.

Premier Dymally returned yesterday to this city after a week's trip to Boston and New York with Mrs. Dymally. The premier is much refreshed by his trip and is back at his executive duties today.

W. K. Tibert, director of vocational education in the province, and J. D. Palmer, of this city, were in conference with Hon. A. P. Paterson, Minister of Education here today. It is understood that matters relating to education were discussed.

## Devon Tax Rate Lower This Year; Council Meeting

Devon's tax rate for the year 1936 is lower by four cents per hundred this year over last year's figure. The tax rate for the ensuing year is \$2.24 on the \$100, while last year the rate was \$2.28 on the \$100. Total assessments for the township of Devon this year was announced earlier as \$29,125.

At the June meeting of the town council of Devon held last evening, at which His Worship Mayor A. J. McEvoy presided, it was announced that the five per cent discount period will end on August 17. Last night's meeting consisted mostly of routine business, the passing of the monthly bills and accounts. Besides the mayor those present were Aldermen Henry, Boone, Ladds, Bailey, Dobie, Flowers and Ashfield.

## NO SUNDAY TENNIS AT MARYSVILLE

Town Council Opposes Playing Tennis on Sunday—Motor Vehicle Infractions to be Investigated and Law More Strictly Enforced.

The Marysville town council at its June meeting last night went on record as opposed to the playing of tennis on Sundays, and a resolution was passed taking the stand that it is forbidden. A petition had been sent to the council asking that Sunday tennis be allowed on the Dawson "Y" courts.

Mayor J. Walter Walker presided at the meeting which was a busy one. The usual bills and accounts were passed. A letter from Roy Carriette stating that there had been complaints made that the Marysville road was not satisfactory, was referred to by the council. The council stated that it was entirely satisfied with the Marysville road, claiming it one of the best in the province. Deputy Mayor Horace Pettigrove presented a statement of receipts and expenditures for the year. An inspection of milk, as well as testing, is being carried on at Marysville at the present time.

The police committee recommended that automobiles not be allowed to park on Canada Street hill, because of hazard to pedestrians. The council approved the recommendation.

A campaign against speeding will be conducted at Marysville, and in this connection the R.C.M.P. will be asked to cooperate by having a constable to assist the town marshal in curbing excessive speeding. There will be a stricter enforcement of the Motor Vehicle Act, and steps will be taken to have autoists who are careless about dimming their lights on passing other cars, apprehended. It was stated that there had been many cases of cars not dimming lights in recent weeks.

The Marysville town council went on record as supporting the application of the Highway Transport Co. for a franchise for a bus service to Marysville. The application of this company along with the Capital Transit, Ltd. will go before the Board of Public Utilities on Thursday of this week.

## NO CONTAGIOUS DISEASES AT HOSP. IN MAY

Isolation Ward at Victoria Hospital Not Used During Month—New Lights to Be Placed in Front of Nurses' Home.

During the month of May the city of Fredericton was entirely free from contagious diseases, according to a report of the superintendent of the Victoria Public Hospital read before the June meeting of the Victoria Hospital Board last evening at the city hall. The isolation ward had not been used during the month. J. A. Reid, president of the board, occupied the chair at last night's meeting.

The superintendent's report showed the following statistics for the month: Number of patients in hospital at beginning of month, 46; patients admitted during month, 77; patients discharged during month, 78; number of patients in hospital at end of month, 44; medical cases admitted, 13; surgical cases admitted, 53; obstetrical cases admitted, 7; births, 4; deaths, 4; major operations, 19; minor operations, 21; x-ray treatments, 7; x-ray examinations, 79; maximum number of patients in one day, 50; minimum number of patients in one day, 25. The Board decided to have lights placed outside the Nurses Home. Considerable routine business was transacted. Those present besides President Reid were C. A. MacVey, C. E. Boone, L. S. Morrison, Mayor Ritchie, Ald. Dr. B. R. Ross, Dr. A. F. Vanwart, Councillor Rowley Manzer, Mrs. D. J. Shea, Miss R. Gerow and F. I. Haviland.
