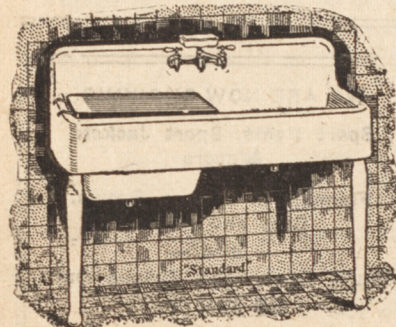

WILKES-BARRE, Pa. — Anthony Munley—"Teacher Munley," they call him in the Langan mining settlement where "he doesn't whip the kids and never gives them homework," stands by his code:

"You never should whip a child. It makes him stubborn."

Teacher Munley, attired in a woolen undershirt, dark trousers, green suspenders and house slippers, was at home today but not at ease, because "all this notoriety makes me so nervous."

Mr. Munley called the parents of his 16 pupils friends as he talked of their protest to the Pittston School

Board that he was too lenient and should be transferred.

He said he wondered why the parents wanted their children whipped when they had not misbehaved.

His explanation for "no homework" was simple:

"I teach eight grades in that one room. At one time I have to take the first grade pupils, then the third grade pupils, and so on until I have heard all their lessons. You can see for your self that when I am busy with one grade the pupils in the others can study their lessons for the next day."

His own life has been one of self-discipline. He gets up at 5.30 A. M., rides four miles and tramps seven.

CAT TYPE WOMAN MOST INTERESTING RELATES AUTHOR

NEW YORK—The most interesting woman in the world, said short story writer Fannie Fernber Fox, is the "cat" type—"lovely to look at, and awful to live with."

"I mean, they're the most interesting from a personality standpoint," explained the sister of Edna Ferber, the novelist. "They make better stories than the 'star-dust and sawdust' girls who are heroines of too much modern magazine fiction."

Woman are far more interesting than men, but less likeable, declared Mrs. Fox in discussing one of her favorite theories: "Every woman is a story."

She said women are "the greatest single source of literary ideas—particularly the ones who are in their thirties, forties and fifties—and are much more fun to watch than men. 'Why? Because they have so many more sides than men,' she replied. 'They are like books of many pages.'

ANGINA-PECTORIS IS BEST TREATED BY MENTAL CALM

(By Dr. James W. Barton)

"The attack consists in the sudden onset of agonizing pain in the region of the heart or underneath the breast bone, with a vise-like gripping or squeezing feeling, and in severe cases, a sense of death. The patient is pale, motionless, and, often bathed in cold perspiration."

This is the definition of what is known as angina pectoris or "breast pang."

It usually occurs suddenly after exertion, excitement or a hearty meal.

Now the fact that it is near the stomach and occurs after excitement or a hearty meal might make one think that it is indigestion for which it is sometimes mistaken.

In the Medical Press and Circular, London, Dr. C. B. Perry points out the three points or characteristics found in angina pectoris (a) the squeezing, constricting, vise-like nature of the pain, (b) the location of the pain (heart or breast bone region), and (c) that it occurs during or following physical or mental activity.

Sometimes angina pectoris is due to certain ailments or condition of the body such as severe anaemia, which, if they can be corrected, will prevent further attacks, but in the majority of cases the cause is unknown. All that is known is that physical exertion, mental strain, severe emotional excitement, and digestive disturbances bring on the attacks.

Dr. Perry states that the outlook for recovery or freedom from attacks is poor when the attacks begin to occur more often, and when the amount of effort necessary to bring on the pain is becoming less.

Another factor in preventing attacks and prolonging life is the degree to which the patient is willing to follow the advice to keep calm in spirit, take little exercise, avoid heavy meals and not eat when tired or excited. This is known as trying to preserve or save the amount of strength the heart possesses—that is the reserve strength of the heart. This is the treatment between attacks—physical and mental calmness or rest.

The treatment during an attack is to give absolute rest which is usually sufficient to end the attack. Inhal-

CROLL AND DIONNE REACH AGREEMENT**Father Consents to Sell Government Another Portion of His Land**

CALLANDER, Ont., Aug. 12—Differences between the Ontario government and Oliva Dionne, father of the quintuplets, as to the care and guardianship of the famous children, appear well on the way to being ironed out. A brief informal chat between Dionne and Hon. David A. Croll, welfare minister, at the father's refreshment stand near here narrowed the breach that has existed almost since the birth of the quint in May, 1934.

So amicable was the conference that Dionne agreed it was not in the interests of his children to install three gasoline tanks in front of his stand directly opposite the quint's playground. Then there was an indication that Oliva might be compensated for the loss of three cows by poisoning recently. The men shook hands as they met and parted cheerily.

After paying a visit to the babies, Mr. Croll, who sponsored the bill in Ontario legislature making the quint wards of the King until they are 18 years of age, walked in to see Dionne who was busy autographing pictures for tourists. As the minister spoke Oliva smiled and thrust out his hand in greeting.

The conversation quickly steered to several matters concerning both the government and Dionne and the father fell in line with suggestions of the minister. He consented to deal with the government for another portion of his land to enlarge the present quintuplet estate. The last time the government wanted some of Oliva's property they were forced to expropriate.

The conversation concluded, Mr. Croll left well satisfied with his efforts and Dionne returned to his autographing which yields him a handsome profit and brings delight to thousands of tourists.
