

tion of a new pennant contender for 1937, was revealed today when it was learned from authoritative sources that waivers had been asked on ten players-while the fate of two others is to be determined by their performances during the closing days of the sea-

The players on whom waivers have been asked are Allan 'Dusty' Cooke, Mel Almada, Henry E. 'Heinie' Manush and Edmund 'Bing" Miller, outfielders; James Henry, Jack Wilson, Jack Russell, and Fritz Ostermueller, pitchers; Moe Berg, catcher and Oscar Melillo, veteran infielder.

George 'Rube' Walberg, veteran portsider, and Johnny Marcum, purchased from Philadelphia as was Foxx, Cramer and McNair, have escaped the initial waiver list by late season spurts.

Still another member of the squad, Herb Pennock, battery coach, has already quit the squad and departed for his home in Philadelphia. Pennock, Russell, Miller and Manush were to be left at home, yesterday, when the Sox opened their last road trip in Washington-but the illness of Marcum, Jack Wilson's arm and Pennock's departure made room on the squad for both Miller and Russell.

Determined to field a champion whatever the price, Tom Yawkey, young millionaire owner of the Sox, threatened to clean house earlier in the season, when two disastrous road trips eliminated the Hose from the 1936 flag race.

Manush, Melillo and Miller, being 10-year players, cannot be demoted to the minors against their will. Manush, however, has been mentioned in a deal with Philadelphia for Wally Moses, fleetfooted outfielder, on whose head Connie Mack had placed an \$80,-000 price tag; Melillo has been boomed as successor to Rogers Hornsby as manager of the St. Louis Browns-though he probably will be retained as accident insurance for the Red Sox infielder since he is still the clever defensive second baseman in the league; while Miller will be placed in an executive position in one of the Sox' growing minor league connections.
