INCOME TAX PROBLEMS

A gift tax was incorporated in the Income Tax Act in 1935. It applies only on gifts where the aggregate value during a year exceeds \$4,000, and is based on a sliding schedule of rates, which varies from 2 per cent. tax on gifts up to \$25,000 to 10 per cent. on those of more than \$1 million. Exempted are donations to charitable or educational institutions and to governments and municipalities. The tax is payable by the doner, or, if he fails to pay, by the recipient.

There is a clause in the act, however, which provides that gifts to any one person which do not total more than \$1,000 in one year, are free of tax. That is, if gifts of \$2,500 are made to two persons, the amount taxable would be \$5,000, the agreegate of the gifts, less the \$4,000 exemption, or \$1,000. If on the other hand, five gifts, each of \$1,000, had been made to five different persons, no tax at all would be payable.

No Deduction Allowed

Such gifts, or gift taxes, are not allowable as a deduction from the income of the doner when he makes out his income returns to the federal department. But neither are they included as part of the income of the recipient. In this respect, it is sometimes necessary to draw a rather fine distinction between a gift and a "bonus." The point of the enquiry would be the extent to which the taxing privileges bestowed under the B. N. A. Act and the social and financial obligations, as now allocated between federal and provincial authorities, are in keeping with the problems and conditions of the 20th century.
