## PLANS MADE FOR COMMUNITY CHRISTMAS TREE

Tree Will Be Placed in Front of Normal School

Opening Thursday

Thousand Bags Candy to Be Distributed to Children

Plans were completed for the Community Christmas Tree programme last night at the regular weekly meeting of the Y's Men's Club. Rolly Loughlin in reporting for the committee in charge said the programme would be opened by His Worship Mayor Kitchen in front of the Normal School Thursday evening promptly at seven o'clock. Community singing of carols will be led by a special children's choir of about 150 voices under the direction of Robin Bailey, chairman of the Y's Men's music committee.

A radiogram was received last night by the Y's Men's Club from Santa Claus stating he would arrive at the tree at 7.30 o'clock drawn by three horses. He regretted that due to the uncertainty of snow he was unable to appear with his familiar reindeer. He added, however, that as a special Christmas Eve treat for the children of the Fredericton district he was bringing one thousand bags of candy to be distributed upon his arrival. He specially requested that parents should accompany the children.

**Santa to Speak**  
The chairman of the committee further reported that there would be a public address system and that Santa would speak briefly over the microphone to the boys and girls. The public address system will be used at intervals all day Thursday when Christmas records will be played.

He also said that Christmas Eve, when the children are singing their carols the words will be flashed on a screen so that children and parents can join in the singing.

After Mr. Loughlin's report the General Secretary of the Community Y spoke briefly on the Community Christmas Tree idea. He emphasized that such a tree can be a symbol and rallying point for the Christmas spirit bringing it out of the narrow confines of the individual home to the broader sphere of the community.

The chairman closed the meeting by expressing the hope that the community at large would enter into the spirit of this occasion and would cooperate to make it a success.

Vices of future procedure are received, which is not anticipated.

The following information for the public was this week issued from the United States consulate at Moncton: After December 31, shippers of merchandise to the United States should mail their consular invoices to Saint John for certification. If they wish the originals to be forwarded directly to the consignee, they should provide stamped addressed envelopes for the purpose.

No new immigration visa applications will be acted upon by the Moncton Consulate. Applicants who have not as yet submitted documents for inspection, should mail their papers to the Saint John office for the purpose. (Those who have submitted documents, but whose papers have not been approved, may continue to apply at Moncton. However, if such applications have not been completed by December 31, the cases will be regarded as closed. Such persons may find it advisable to submit fresh applications at once to the Saint John Consulate. Applicants whose documents have been approved by the Moncton office, will doubtless prefer to complete all formalities at Moncton prior to December 31.

Registrations of American citizens will be transferred from Moncton to Saint John on December 31. Specimens of signatures and seals of notaries public will also be transferred on that date.

Mr. Johnson has been United States Vice-Consul at Fredericton for about ten years. He is one of the best officials ever sent here by the United States government. Both he and Mrs. Johnson are deservedly popular with a large circle of friends and their popularity in the community should be a factor in maintaining the friendly relationships which exist between ourselves and our neighbors next door.

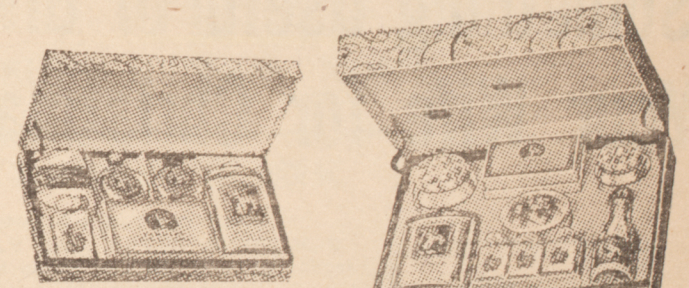

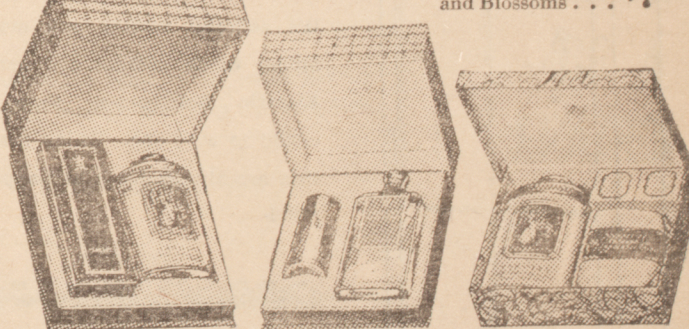
