MANY MESSAGES TO BE BROADCAST TO FAR NORTH BY CITIZENS CHRISTMAS EVE

Applications Come From People Both in Canada and the United States --- Programme to Be Known as 'Bringing Christmas to the Frontier.'

OTTAWA, Dec. 22—A blind mother whose son is a missionary at Craig Harbour; a sister whose brother is stationed at Pangnirtung, Baffin Island; an Alberta woman whose son, a Royal Canadian Mounted Police constable at Fort Resolution, has not been home for twelve years, and a father whose daughter is a nurse at Chesterfield Inlet, will be among those who, on Christmas Eve, between 10 p.m., and 12 midnight, will have the opportunity of personally broadcasting messages of good cheer for the Yuletide season to their relatives in the Arctic regions. The broadcasts are being arranged as a special programme, to be known as "Bringing Christmas to the Frontier," and will be transmitted by the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation over its national network. Provided atmospheric conditions are normally good the messages will be heard without difficulty at outposts in Canada's farthest north.

Many Applications
A virtual avalanche of applications from people in all walks of life, from both Canada and the United States, seeking permission to broadcast messages personally, has been received at Corporation headquarters in Ottawa since invitations were issued a few days ago. Expressions of delight that such a service is to be rendered by the Corporation almost without exception are emphasized in these letters. Officials in charge of the broadcast, however, stated today that while all applications will be given the utmost consideration, time limitations of necessity will force a restriction on broadcasting privileges. As many as possible of the applicants nevertheless will be given the opportunity of speaking to their relatives.

Of the hundreds seeking to participate in the novel service, a large percentage commend the Corporation for the "thoughtfulness" of its course. One writer says: "I am trying to visualize the pleasure it will give to the different persons in the north when they hear a voice they long coming to them over the air. I was speaking to a man from the north and he tried to tell me how he felt when he heard his mother's voice some time ago. . . ." Another applicant states: "Really, you cannot

"A Splendid Idea"

One man, who wishes to send greetings to Devon Island, in the eastern Arctic, compliments the Corporation for its "wonderful thoughtfulness in arranging such a programme, and I am most certain that it will be a God-send to our far-off friends." A woman, who has relatives in Baffin Land says that: "I think this is a splendid idea and I am sure it will be greatly appreciated by the people living in those isolated places. One may have lived in the north to realize fully what a thrill there is in hearing a familiar voice over the air."

The Corporation's invitation to take part in the two-hour programme is being extended for a few more days. Applicants should bear in mind, however, that those persons to whom they wish to speak must be beyond the line of ordinary communication. No message will be transmitted where a similar service may be carried out by telegraph or telephone facilities. All messages broadcast will be limited to twenty words.

Dr. Dafoe Will Participate in Xmas Broadcast

From his book-lined study in his home at Callender, Ont., will come a Christmas Day message from Dr. Allan Roy Dafoe, O.B.E., the country physician who rose from obscurity to world fame when he brought into the world the Dionne Quintuplets. Dr. Dafoe is scheduled to participate in "Canada Broadcasts Christmas," the special hour-long presentation to be produced by the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation and to be heard over the national network in Canada and over the Blue network of the National Broadcasting Company in the United States from 4 to 5 p.m., EST, Dec. 25. He will describe for listeners the celebrations which took place Christmas morning at the Dafoe Hospital when the quints gathered around their gift-burdened Christmas tree. Dr. Dafoe also will have a message which he will deliver especially to mothers. Corporation engineers and continuity men already are at Callender arranging for this phase of the broadcast.

BROADCAST NOTES ... XMAS ...

National network listeners of the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation will hear a special Christmas programme to be broadcast Dec. 25, at 7:15 p.m., EST, from the Montreal studios by the Lasalle Cavaliers. The Cavaliers will open their programme with a tango, "La Bella Argentina," and will continue with "Nights of Gladness," a waltz; "I'm Going Home for Christmas," a fox trot; "Pure Classe," a tango, and "Yo Hasta El Cielo Daria," a rumba.

The Canadian Broadcasting Corporation's internationally known "Lyric Trio" will be heard over the national network on Dec. 25, at 7:45 p.m., EST, in a programme of music designed especially for the festive season. The selections to be sung by the Trio, which will have Allan McIver as piano accompanist, are: "Cloches de Noel," by Delmas; "The Sleigh," by Kountz; "Sainte Marguerite," by Harm; "Faites-moi un homme sans tete," by Willan, and "Cocche dans le loin," by Mireille.

A programme designed as a feature of special interest and appeal to children at Christmastide will be presented over the national network of the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation at 9:30 p.m., EST, from the Montreal studios. The programme, which will replace the regularly scheduled "Arabesque," will be "Pirouette." It will feature Howard Fogg and his orchestra, Charles Hutchins, baritone and Therese Berthelet, soprano. The programme will open with the orchestra playing "Irish Jig," by Hadley. Charles Hutchins will sing "Green Eyed Dragon," by Charles, the orchestra will play "Cradle Song," by Delacour, Therese Berthelet will sing "Avant d'être Capitaine," by Alongi. Mr. Hutchins will sing "Wind on the Hill," a composition by Fraser-Simpson, words by A. A. Milne, and the orchestra will play "Music Box," by Friml. Miss Berthelet will sing "Papa n'a pas voulu," by Scotti and there will be a duet by Miss Berthelet and Mr. Hutchins from a collection of Cradle Songs. The orchestra will conclude the programme with "A petit pas," by Sudessl.

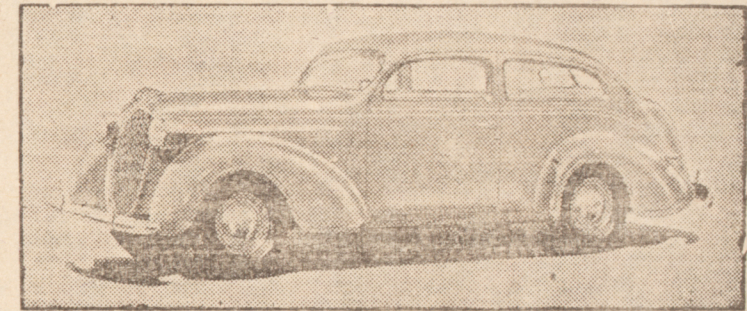
