reasons why it is so difficult to get co-operative action in farm communities.

"If you place the child in the midst of your community and direct your thoughts toward his future, farms will take care of themselves," he averred, asking the institutes also to use their efforts that good teachers be recognized and retained in the children's best interests instead of permitting them to be changed each year or two. Salaries paid rural teachers, he felt, were deeply at the root of the trouble, and it should not be impossible for rural boards to pay salaries as attractive as those paid in urban schools. Stating that urban schools are at present benefiting from experienced teachers at the cost of rural, the Deputy Minister felt the process should be reversed.

"Until these conditions are remedied, we are not doing justice to country boys and girls. At the same time a teacher with ability has much more scope of usefulness in a rural community than in town or city because of the opportunity provided for leadership," he said.

That no scheme for larger rural school units would be foisted on the people without their consent and co-operation he made very clear.

Dealing with adult education, Dr. McArthur stated that, unless the child learns in the public school the meaning of education and importance of acquiring knowledge, the movement cannot go far.

"As far as the present adult population goes," he said, "we might as well wipe the slate clean and begin with the new generation."

"With the country so flooded with literature from sources outside, it is imperative that Canadian and Empire ideals be incorporated in Canadian school books," he declared.

Dealing with promotion of various educational programmes carried on throughout the institutes, Mrs. Abbott stated that if adult education is the hope of the world it is also the hope of the community and the individual.
