PEOPLE BECOME CONSCIOUS OF RURAL EDUCATION

R. W. Maxwell of Woodstock Delivered Fine Address at Institute

Change For the Better

Says There Should Be More Money Spent on Rural Education

R. W. Maxwell, B.S.A., who is in charge of the agricultural school at Woodstock, this morning in an address before the York and Sunbury Teachers' Institute at the high school remarked on the change of attitude in the province toward rural education. The change, he said, was decidedly for the better. He noted that 68 per cent. of the population of this province is rural. He believed there should be a greater percentage of money spent for education in rural sections than there is at the present time.

Other speakers at this morning's session of the biennial meeting of the Institute were I. B. Rouse, M.A., who reported on the meeting of the Canadian Federation, which he attended at Saskatoon, and also O. V. B. Miller, M.A., who spoke on the "New Brunswick Teachers' Association." Mr. Miller pointed out the advantages of this association and referred also to the increase in membership of over 40 per cent. in the past year.

Election of officers is scheduled for this afternoon, when this year's Institute meeting will come to a close. The feature address on this afternoon's programme is by W. K. Tibert, director of vocational education for New Brunswick, whose subject is "Vocational Education."

Community singing opened this morning's meeting and after the address the Institute divided into primary, intermediate and high school sections for discussion.

Yesterday's Session

Yesterday afternoon's session was significant because of a splendid address by Prof. A. F. Bird. This address will be printed in full in tomorrow's issue of The Daily Mail. Last evening a Visual Education period was conducted at which three reels of film were shown under the direction of R. K. Nevers, principal of Charlotte Street school. Afterwards a social period was enjoyed with Ralph J. Albrant, "Y" Secretary, in charge. The choir of St. Paul's United church were present and sang a number of selections. Miss Kaye Horwood rendered a violin selection. Games were played in the basement of the high school and refreshments served.

Geological Society U.N.B. on Excursion Yesterday

The members of the Geological Society of the Sophomore class of U.N.B. went on an expedition yesterday. The excursion was under the direction of Professor S. C. Perry and included research work at Kingsclear, Spring Hill and other points.

STANLEY MAY NOT HAVE A DAILY WINTER SERVICE

Rumor That It Will Be Curtailed to Tri-Weekly Service

Register Complaint

Board of Trade Recommends 'Jitney' Service Stanley - Cross Creek

Residents of Stanley, York county, are perturbed about reports that the Canadian National Railway plan to curtail the winter railway service from a daily to tri-weekly service or less, and have registered a protest with W. G. Clark, M.P., for York-Sunbury.

Stanley has been on a regular bi-weekly service during the summer months but there are reports that, because of the expense and delay entailed, that during the winter months the usual daily service will be cut to three times a week.

The Fredericton Board of Trade at its meeting last night passed a resolution that the transportation committee confer with W. U. Appleton, divisional head of the C.N.R., and ask that a "jitney" service be placed on the Stanley-Cross Creek route during the winter, to connect with the Devon-Newcastle service, if the service is made tri-weekly.

It is felt by railway authorities that the through service from Devon to Newcastle would be greatly improved on the tri-weekly arrangement for Stanley. At the present time it is necessary for the C.N.R. to "back" a train into Stanley off the main line, which means a delay of about one hour as well as expense, oftentimes not made up by passengers in that sector.

The general opinion of last night's meeting of the Board of Trade was that the service to Stanley at present "is a fair service." Doubt was expressed that a daily service could be secured for the winter.

PARTRIDGE SEASON ENDS

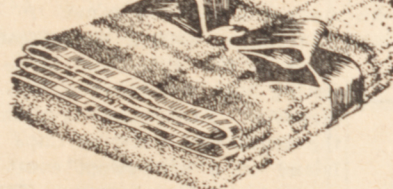

E. M. Taylor, Secretary, Announces Live Fox Show

Growing Importance

Need Production of High Quality Pelts

E. M. Taylor, of the department of agriculture, and secretary of the New Brunswick Fox Breeders' Association today announced that a live fox show will be held in Moncton, November 24th and 25th.

The growing importance of the fox industry and the urgent necessity for the production of high class pelts, to meet the demands of trade has prompted the executive of the Association to sponsor this live fox exhibit. The industry brings about a million and a half dollars of new wealth each year.

In recent years competition from foreign countries has grown, which will necessitate better quality in this province to compete favorably. The show offers an opportunity to New Brunswick breeders to bring to the attention of the public the quality of their product.

Mr. Taylor mentions that the show will have two divisions, registered foxes and registered fox breeders and second, unregistered foxes and breeders. This arrangement offers the opportunity to a large majority of ranchers who have not had previous opportunities to enter the live fox show.
