He will proceed to Halifax, where he is scheduled to speak this week on the subject of Adult Education. Many enjoyed his lecture here last night.

GOT TWO PARTRIDGES

Early partridge hunters were greeted with some excellent weather this morning, quite the contrary of opening day, when a heavy drizzle of rain kept many from entering the woods. The season will not close until Oct. 31. Partridge are reported to be quite thick in flocks, although the flocks are not quite so numerous as in other seasons. Probably the first successful hunter of the partridge season is F. Emerson Edgecombe of this city, who shot two early yesterday morning.

GASOLINE DROPS ONE CENT

The price of all brands of gasoline, save Ethyl, has dropped one cent per gallon and is effective today throughout the Maritimes. The tank wagon price is now 16 and 18 cents per gallon. The new retail price for all brands will be 28 cents per gallon for ordinary standards and 30 cents for Ethyl. A similar drop in kerosene is reported. An "easier" crude oil market together with seasonal fluctuations in demand is given as the cause of the drop. The new prices are effective at all local garages and filling stations today.

ATTENDS CONVENTION

Mrs. J. Vermeeren has returned to the city, after attending the annual Hairdressers' Convention at Montreal. Place Fingerlings in Nashwaak River; Work Progressing

During the week ending today Allen R. Menzies has placed in the vicinity of 30,000 salmon fingerlings in the Nashwaak river. These were placed in the river in the vicinity of Stanley and were brought from the salmon hatcheries at Florenceville. On Saturday last 13,000 fingerlings, each a couple of inches long, were brought down and placed in the Nashwaak river at Stanley. On Wednesday 4,000 more were added and this morning Mr. Menzies left here for Stanley with an additional 12,000. It is said by those in a position to know that 12,000 of these fingerlings are of as good a value as 100,000 salmon fry, as a very small proportion of the fry develop to maturity.

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REGINA TO BE SITE FOR MEETING EDUCATION HEADS

Dr. A. S. McFarlane, Chief Supt. of Education to Be Present

Important Conference

Purpose to Bring About Uniformity in Compiling Statistics

Dr. A. S. McFarlane, Chief Superintendent of Education is leaving this afternoon for Winnipeg to spend a two weeks' vacation in the Canadian West after which he will attend the meetings of the Canadian Education Association to be held at Regina on Oct. 19, 20, 21 to be followed on Oct. 22 by a conference, one day Oct. 22, with J. E. Robbins, head of the Education Branch of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. The purpose of the conference is to bring about uniformity in compiling educational statistics in the different provinces. Dr. McFarlane will be accompanied on the trip by Mrs. McFarlane and their daughter, Beatrice.

It will be the 17th meeting of the Canadian Education Association. Dr. G. F. Rogers of Toronto is the president and Dr. H. F. Munro, of Halifax, N. S., is the vice-president. Dr. McFarlane is an honorary president. Some of the more interesting items on the programme will be the address of Dr. W. L. Lue, associated professor of Psychology at the University of Toronto, representing the Canadian National committee on mental hygiene; reports on educational movements and changes in educational policy in the various provinces since the 1934 convention, one of which is to be given by the New Brunswick superintendent of education; an address, "Changing Education," to be given by Hon. G. M. Weir, minister of education for British Columbia.

On Tuesday, October 20 an informal dinner will be given at the Hotel Saskatchewan at which the special speaker will be President Sidney Smith of the University of Manitoba. H. H. Trimble, B.A., Superintendent of Schools at Moncton, N. B., will be one of the speakers on Wednesday, October 21, his subject to be "Specialized Training for Teachers of Rural Schools."

MONEY SPENT IN THIS CITY

The directors of Fredericton Exhibition, Ltd. who met this week showed to what extent the exhibition benefits local people, when they found that of the total of \$5,493.77 paid out in bills accrued during exhibition week, a total of \$5,145.76 of that amount was paid to local people. This, according to the secretary, is a pretty good sign of the value of the Fredericton exhibition to this city. \$20,000 ADDITION TO HIGH SCHOOL IS PROPOSED

Building to Be Started in Early Spring is Reported

Bldg. Overcrowded

Teachers Dissatisfied by Not Getting Advances in Salary

While the school trustees at their closed door meetings consider their deliberations secret and only send out ready-to-wear reports to a certain part of the press it is learned, however, on good authority, that at the closed door meeting this week it was decided to erect in the near future, a \$20,000 addition to the Fredericton High School. This addition, it is stated by one of the leading trustees, is urgently needed.

A few years ago when the Fredericton High School was built, it was then thought that the building was not needed and that it was altogether too large to meet the requirements of the city of Fredericton. Today that building is overcrowded and both the teachers and the pupils are compelled to work under conditions which are not adequate.

It is understood that the new addition to the High School will be of brick and along the same style as the present building, and that it will be erected as an addition on the side of the building facing what is commonly called the lower graveyard lane. It is understood that it is too late in the fall to make any move toward building this year. It is said, however, that the new addition will be started as soon as the frost is out of the ground in the early spring and will be completed in time for the re-opening of the fall term next year. Dr. G. C. Vanwart, the chairman of the school board, is said to be one of the leading promoters in urging the building of the addition to the High School. Therefore there cannot be much doubt that the building will be proceeded with as soon as the city council turns over the money next year.

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FIRE PREVENTION WEEK WILL HAVE SPECIAL FEATURES

Fredericton Fire Dept. to Attend Church on Sunday

Wreaths at Cenotaph

Fire Loss in the City to Date Amounts to \$44,498.

The Fredericton fire department, under Chief Karl Walker, will inaugurate Fire Prevention Week on Sunday with a special service at George Street Baptist church, and the laying of a wreath at the Cenotaph in tribute to three deceased members of the fire department, Harry Rutter one-time fire chief, Alfred Boddington, and William Smith.

Fire Chief Walker today gave a report on fire losses in this city, which amounts to total property damage of \$669,043, over the ten year period from 1926 to 1935. The total number of fires in that time was 468.

The fire loss in the city for the period from January 1, 1936, until August 4, 1936, amounts to \$44,498. Over one-half of this amount, states the fire chief, was due to carelessness on the part of owners or occupants of dwellings or buildings. The bulk of the loss was in the Edgecombe fire in January. Last year the total fire loss was \$21,200.

The fire losses in the Province of New Brunswick for the ten year period from 1926 to 1935 was \$17,733,660, and this included a total of 9,690 fires.

Of the provincial statistics it is shown that the loss of life during that period totalled 13 persons, three men, two women, and eight children. Five children were burned to death in one fire on account of the mother leaving the house on an errand and leaving the children in bed.

START MONDAY PAVE LINCOLN-GAGETOWN ROAD

M'Namara Construction Co. Has Contract For the Work

Rock Fill Flats

Other Routes Suggested While Oromocto Work is Underway

The McNamara Construction Company, Ltd., which has the contract for the construction and paving of No. 2 Highway between Lincoln and Gagetown, will start Monday morning, October 5th to lay a rock fill across the Oromocto Flats at Wilmot Wharf. This will necessitate the crossing of that section of the Highway between Wilmot Wharf and the Oromocto Bridge.

The Department of Public Works has arranged a detour, leaving No. 2 Highway about six miles below Fredericton via the Nevers Road, Waas Road, Harris Bridge and the West Oromocto Road to the junction of Routes Nos. 2 and 2A in Oromocto Village.

This detour will be adequately marked throughout and, in addition, watchmen will be stationed to direct traffic.

Those making use of the highway are reminded that they can use the Douglas Valley Road, through West field to Fredericton Junction, through Tracy and New Maryland into Fredericton, in preference to the main road and the detour around Oromocto Flats.


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
