BOARD OF REVIEW SITS

The New Brunswick Board of Review under the Farmers' Creditors' Arrangement Act, with Mr. Justice C. D. Richards, chairman, is sitting at Burton today. Yesterday the Board met here to consider one case. Other members of the board are W. A. B. McLellan, of this city, representing the creditors, and A. C. Barker, of Lakeville, representing the debtors. S. R. Kelly, of Saint John is registrar.

TAX COLLECTIONS

Tax collections for the month of July 1936, amounted to \$186,252.50, according to the report of tax collections given last night at the regular meeting of the city council by Ald. Raymond Crowdon. In July, 1935, tax collection were \$190,053.24. These collections were over the discount period, whereby many paid their taxes in full in order to benefit from the five per cent discount.

WISH TO OPERATE BUS LINE

William A. Wilson has applied under provisions of the Motor Carrier Act for a certificate to operate a motor vehicle as a freight common carrier for compensation on the following route: Woodstock to Edmundston, N. B. The application will be heard by the Motor Carrier Board on August 17 at eleven o'clock in the forenoon.

ENTER PARTNERSHIP

J. Pith Brittain of Saint John, and Edward R. Taylor also of Saint John, have entered into a partnership for the purpose of carrying on the business of operating omnibuses, motor buses of all kinds, and motor trucks at such places as they may see fit, and also to operate any garage or garages in connection. They will do business under the name of "Maritime Transit Company," with head office at Saint John.

A BRIEF MEETING

Last night's August city council meeting was a brief one. Ald. Ivan McKnight gave the report of the fire chief for the month of July, which showed the fire loss to have been only \$225. It is planned to repair the main planks of the fire station floor, and some mention was made of the possibility of a concrete floor to replace the present one. Progress was reported on the city's investigation into chain stores.

DR. MILNER HERE

Dr. W. C. Milner, historian and writer, who has been spending the past month in eastern Canada principally at Halifax is in the city today. Dr. Milner spent the last winter at Edmonton, Alberta, and came east a couple of months ago. Despite the fact that he is considerably over 90 years of age the doctor is hale and hearty. He spent the morning going over the archives at the Legislative library.

DIED [AT MCADAM]

The death occurred yesterday at the Royal Hotel in McAdam of George William Golding, aged 89 years, and one of McAdam's best known residents. He had been proprietor of the Royal Hotel there. Surviving besides his wife is one son, Thomas Golding of Hanwell; two sisters, Mrs. William McCullagh of North Beltrick, Mass., and Mrs. Thomas Letson, of this city; also one brother James of McAdam. The funeral will take place on Thursday afternoon with service at two o'clock at the Royal Hotel, when Rev. E. R. McCordick will officiate. Interment will be made at the Rockland cemetery.

R. B. Hanson Won't Run

Think They May Re-
deem York County
From Liberals

According to newspapers friendly to the local Conservative party the call has gone forth for a gathering of the clans to be held in this city during the present month. This was decided during the past week or ten days. It is not known yet who will admit his willingness to place someone upon the altar of sacrifice.

The Conservative party is anticipating a by-election to take place in York in the not far distant future, but, of course, the matter of fixing the date is not in their hands at the present time. Some criticism is being made by press supporting the Conservative party in this county to the effect that the government is afraid to call a by-election at the present time. It is pointed out on the other hand that the vacancy caused by the death of the late Stewart L. Durling only took place a few weeks ago, and that it would be most inconvenient to the farmers of the county to bring on a by-election at the present time. It is also pointed out that during the time of the late Baxter-Tilley administration there was a period extending over a year, and including a legislative session, when there were at least four vacancies in the legislature at one time, and two of them were from the county of York. York county has three capable members, one of whom is a cabinet minister, and the affairs of the county are carried on in pretty good shape under their care.

According to many prominent Liberals and Conservatives interviewed there does not seem to be any great outcry against the Dysart government, which only a few months ago swept the country clean. The only complaints seem to come from some disgruntled office seekers who tried to get positions which they were not qualified to fill, and these are very few.

Hon. R. B. Hanson, K.C., former Minister of Trade and Commerce in the Bennett government, states pos-

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EARLY SHIPMENT
OF N. B. SPUDS TO
THE ARGENTINE

Ambassadors Conducted
Inspection of N. B.
Spud Fields

Agreement Expected

Argentine Buyers Are
Keenly Interested in
Seed Stock

The probability of an early shipment of New Brunswick potatoes to the Argentine, and subsequent increased agricultural exchange with that country, is indicated in the four-day inspection tour of the potato growing areas in the St. John river valley by two Argentine ambassadors, including a potato specialist from Buenos Aires.

Although no announcement was forthcoming today from the Department of Agriculture here, it is anticipated that some agreement will be reached whereby shipments of New Brunswick potatoes will be made to the Argentine and that in return the Argentine will ship meat as fox feed, and possibly canned and frozen meat attractive enough to interest fox ranchers.

The Argentine ambassadors are Carlos Garcia-Mata, commercial attache to the Argentine embassy in Washington, D. C., and Dr. Roberto Millan, a potato specialist with the Argentine Department of Agriculture. Besides visiting the principal potato growers they also visited some of the prominent fox breeders of the province.

G. C. Cunningham of this city, who returned here recently from a trip to the Argentine, was responsible for the visit here of the Argentine ambassadors. Mr. Cunningham's trip was specifically to work with the provincial department of agriculture. Mr. Cunningham would not comment on the matter today.

Yesterday, J. K. King, deputy minister of agriculture met the Argentine visitors at Presque Isle, Maine, and conducted them on their tour of the upper counties of the province. Commencing at St. Leonard's, the party inspected fields and farms throughout the potato districts. The

Survey Road Projects

A special committee from the Municipality of Saint John, headed by W. A. Ross, was in conference with Premier A. A. Dysart here this morning. The conference, it is understood was called by the premier to discuss the various relief measures he had outlined last month. The committee is a special one from the Saint John municipality on the government's proposed highway projects. The roadwork projects are suggested it is understood, as assistance for direct relief conditions in the city of Saint John, and call for paving the road between Rothesay Corner and Gondola Point; paving ten miles of the Loch Lomond Road and about three miles of the Red Head Road, as well as several smaller schemes.

While the report was not confirmed today by the premier it is expected that Hon. Mr. Dysart in company with C. B. Croasdale, the chief highway engineer, will leave here either today or tomorrow on a tour of provincial highways to survey the improvement projects which have been underway for several weeks in the governments paving programme.
