## SUGGESTION OF BATHING BEACH AT EAST END

Only Fair to Residents at That Section of the City

Expense Would be Small  
West End Beach Being Cleaned Up at the Present Time

For some years past there have been two bathing beaches in the city. One of these is at the west end which has been kept up at the expense of the city and been supplied with floats and bathing houses. The other beach is at the east end on Waterloo Row and this has been a very popular center for both children and grownups who reside in the east end of the city. This east end beach has been kept up and supplied with floats by the young men who use the beach. At a recent meeting of the city council it was decided to fix up the west end beach and improve conditions in that locality. And rightly so. At the same time it was suggested at the council that the city replace the float at the east end beach which had been carried away by the spring freshet. The expense of doing this would be small compared to the expense which was suggested for the west end beach. An objection was made by certain members of the council that the beach at the east end was unsanitary owing to the fact that the sewerage outlet on Waterloo Row was not far from the section used as a beach.

It was proposed that the people at the east end of the city use the west end beach which is considerably over a mile from the east end of the city. It has since been proposed by some of the aldermen who are members of the A and B Club that if the people at the east end do not wish to travel to the west end beach that they pay a fee of \$4 a year and secure the bathing privileges of the A and B Club. It is understood that some of the parents of children residing in the east end have already done this, but there are others who feel that they cannot afford to do so. It is now suggested by some of the residents of the east end that if the east end bathing beach is unsanitary that a spot farther up the river in the vicinity of the A and B Club be used as a bathing beach and that the city put a float at that point. This would seem to be only fair to the residents of the east end of the city, and especially to the grown-ups

Of late years his health has not been of the best, although his friends will be glad to know that he is in better condition now than for some time. It is understood that the appointment will be made during the present summer.

## EXTENSION OF HYDRO BEFORE N. B. COMMISSION

Harvey, Hatfield's Point, Burt's Corner, Ask For Electricity

Commission Meets Here

Premier A. A. Dymally and the cabinet are expected to meet here this afternoon, and probably a night session will be held. Tomorrow government supporters in the Legislature are expected to convene here with the cabinet members in a party caucus and discuss various matters of policy.
