AT WORK ON STREETS

A crew of city employees were at work today on Queen street, clearing away the excess snow and slush which accumulated in yesterday's thaw and made it virtually impossible for the citizens to cross from one side of the street to the other.

Mr. Anderson will go from Saint John to his home at Newcastle. Hon. Dr. W. F. Roberts returned home by train. Hon. A. C. Taylor leaves for his home this afternoon.

CONSIDER BY-LAWS

The city council will meet once again as a committee of the whole this evening to further study the by-laws of the city. The council has been engaged at revision work on the by-laws for more than a week now, and will continue for several more before the by-laws will be ready to be submitted for approval.

PAPER CAUGHT FIRE

PROV. MINISTERS ATTEND OTTAWA CONFERENCE

Continuation Committee on Financial Subjects

Leave on Week-end

Provincial Government Concludes Its Meeting

The provincial cabinet ended its meeting here last night shortly before midnight, and this morning the out-of-town ministers left for their respective homes. Premier Dwyer is expected to remain here until Sunday, when he will leave for Montreal and Ottawa.

Besides Premier Dwyer, Hon. C. T. Richard, provincial secretary-treasurer, and Hon. P. W. Pirie, minister of lands and mines; A. W. Barbour, Deputy Minister of Public Works, and James H. Conlon, new Director of Federal and Municipal Relations, will leave for Ottawa on Saturday where the continuation committee on financial subjects developing from the Dominion-Provincial conference at Ottawa in December, 1935, will resume discussion of matters on the original agenda. The premier will be in Montreal on Monday night when he will address the members of the Maritime Provinces' Club, together with Premier Angus L. Macdonald of Nova Scotia, and Premier Thane Campbell of Prince Edward Island.

Following the conference at Ottawa the premier, Hon. Mr. Richard and Hon. Mr. Pirie will attend the meeting of the National Liberal Association at Ottawa on December 10.

At last night's session of the cabinet, two members of the University of New Brunswick Senate, Dr. C. C. Jones, President of U.N.B., and Chief Justice J. H. Barry, presented the Senate's budget plan to the government for consideration.

A delegation from Charlotte county yesterday afternoon presented proposals for a "fishing industry enterprise which, it was said, would benefit southern New Brunswick fishermen if it materialized. No details of the enterprise were announced by the Premier. The delegation was composed of J. J. Hayes Doone, M.P.P., Black's Harbor; John F. Calder, fisheries inspector; Welchpool, and H. W. Welch and H. O. Wentworth, of Deer Island.

Earl Hickson, F'ton's Number One Air Pilot

Earl Hickson, Fredericton's best known and most experienced pilot, is in the limelight again. A despatch from Toronto, Ont., describes the first leg of a Newcastle, Delaware to Sioux Lookout hop, which was completed in three hours, five minutes flying time, in "a sleek new Curtis-powered Balanca 12-place airbus which slipped into the Toronto Flying Club." Aboard the plane besides several officials of the Hennessey Airlines was Earl Hickson, who piloted the craft. The despatch continues: "It was one of the largest commercial planes ever purchased by a Canadian company and is destined for passenger and freight service in the Pickle and Red Lake mining areas. Quite a stir was occasioned when the big ship arrived here, there being no hangar available large enough to accommodate her 35-foot wingspread." Friends and relatives of Mr. Hickson here will learn with interest of the Fredericton air pilot's exploits in the commercial air field.

BANK TRANSFERS

Frank Tracey, who has been teller at the Royal Bank of Canada here, has been transferred to the branch at Moncton and left last evening for his new position. MORE HOURS AND MORE WAGES AT MARYSVILLE MILL

Result of Liberal Rule Cotton Mill Operators Doing Better

Mr. Dolphin Talks

Mill Did Not Have to Close Down After All

According to Joseph Dolphin, manager of the Canadian Cottons, Limited at Marysville, conditions are much brighter than they have been for some time in the cotton industry at Marysville. The mill has been on full time for the past twelve weeks and at various times during the past year different departments have been running full time and in some cases overtime.

The manager of the Marysville mill stated today that he has not yet received any official notification from Montreal regarding the increased wages to employees in the local mill. But in effect the company announcement made yesterday that the increase of six per cent in wages of some 3,300 employees in the seven mills of the Canadian Cottons, Limited, will affect the Marysville mill. The announcement made in Montreal was to the effect that the mills affected would include that at Marysville and Milltown, N. B., as well as the plant of the York and Cornwall mills at Saint John. The company announcement said the increase restores wages to the 1929 level. In April of 1933 the company instituted a 10 per cent reduction about half of which was restored a year later. The advance in wages now announced is made possible at this time by the considerably larger volume of orders booked during recent weeks, permitting in turn, fuller operation at most of the mills.

A year ago last November just previous to the federal election which swept Mackenzie King's party into power, there were numerous employees of the Canadian Cottons, Ltd., who were told that if the Liberals were returned to power the Marysville mill in company with other mills would have to close down. There was a great hullabaloo made at Marysville and it must come like a judgment upon the heads of those Marysville authorities to have to get out now and acknowledge that everything is bright, that working hours and wages have increased. Those people who were ready to fight The Daily Mail, when we predicted just what would happen, should now take their hat off to The Daily Mail. But we are not going to ask them too. All we have to say is good luck, gentlemen. More hours and more wages under Liberal rule.

CHANGES BEING MADE IN PROV. EDUCATION PLAN

Dr. MacFarlane and Dr. Peacock Duties Will Not Overlap

To Unify System

Normal School Courses Will Be Lengthened; University Changes

It is understood on good authority that the appointment of Dr. Fletcher Peacock as Director of Educational Services will in no way affect the standing of Dr. A. S. McFarlane, who has for some time past acted as Chief Superintendent of Education. Dr. McFarlane will as in the past have control of the schools throughout the province and perform much the same duties as in the past.

Dr. Peacock will have charge of all technical education and vocational training. He will take up work in connection with certain changes of the training department at the Normal School and will also work towards the consolidation and unification of the various branches of training, both practical and academic.

There is bound to be certain changes in our educational system and Dr. Peacock will work along the development of these changes. These will probably include an extension of the Normal School terms, until ultimately a two-year course will be provided for teachers who wish to qualify for first and second class licenses. This is along the line of nearly all other provinces and states. Some of the states even have a four-year Normal School course.

The province must expect to look forward to very many changes in our educational system, in order to bring it up to date. These will include changes in the Normal School, the University of New Brunswick, and the matter of Extension courses and Adult Education. Along all these lines Prof. Peacock will be expected to work out a programme so that our academic and technical education may be extended, unified and consolidated.

RELIEF FOR WINTER MONTHS

The city of Fredericton, through committee chairman Ald. F. S. Mundle and T. Earle Doohan, have placed a working plan before the government with respect to its request for government assistance for relief during the winter months. Within recent weeks quite considerable unemployment has been caused by men being laid off fall and summer work, now completed. This will mean that the city will have to act promptly to see that relief or work is given these men.

SIX CANDIDATES FROM U.N.B. TRY FOR SCHOLARSHIP

Selection Rhodes Scholar For N. B. Made Tomorrow

3 of Class '37 U.N.B.

Winner to Be Announced on Saturday Afternoon

Six representatives of the University of New Brunswick, three of the graduates of the class of 1937, will appear before the committee on selection of the Rhodes Scholar for this province, tomorrow morning at Saint John. A total of 15 in all will appear individually before the committee. The meeting will be held in the executive council chambers at Saint John. Mr. Gerald Teed is secretary of the committee. Announcement of the winner will be made some time Saturday afternoon.

Members of the committee are Judge H. O. McInerney, chairman, Howard P. Robinson, Dr. George F. Skinner, Adrian B. Gilbert, Gerald Lawson, and Mr. Teed, all of Saint John, and G. F. G. Bridges, of Moncton.

The University of New Brunswick candidates this year are George D. Johnston, son of Mr. and Mrs. William Johnston, of this city, graduate of 1935, who has been studying at Toronto University this year; Albert Edwards, of Hartland, graduate of 1936; Norman W. Wood, Moncton, graduate of 1935 and now laboratory assistant in physics at the U.N.B.; and also three undergraduates this year, R. Reed Logie, of Chatham, James R. Mallory, of St. Andrews, and Herbert R. G. Giberson, of Sheet Harbor, N. S.

The candidates will leave for Saint John this evening and will return here tomorrow evening.
